This Week's Calendar of Feasts and Saints:

Sunday 1st May (Divine Mercy Sunday) - St. Joseph the Worker Not celebrated this year.

Monday 2nd May – St. Athanasius (bishop and doctor of the Church) Athanasius was born in Alexandria in 295. He fought ceaselessly against the Arian heresy, defending the true and equal divinity of Christ

Tuesday 3rd May – St. Philip and St. James (Apostles) In the Gospel of John, Philip asks to see, and having seen, he tells the good news to others. Formerly a disciple of John the Baptist, he became a follower of Christ. James was the son of Alphaeus and a cousin of the Lord. He ruled the Church at Jerusalem, wrote an Epistle and led a life of penance. He converted many people of Jerusalem to the faith and was martyred in the year 62

Wednesday 4th May – St. Conleth (bishop) Believed to have come from the Wicklow area. While living as a hermit he was persuaded by Brigid to act as priest for her community in Kildare. He was venerated as a great saint and Cogitosus, in his 'Life of Brigid' calls him bishop and abbot of the monks of Kildare. He was buried beside Brigid in the great church there

Thursday 5th May – Blessed Edmund Rice (religious) [1762-1844] After his young wife's early death he sold his possessions and dedicated his life to the education of the poor. To advance the work, he gathered like-minded men who took religious vows together to work for the Catholic education of boys.

St. Comgall was born around 526 in Co. Antrim. His father was a soldier and wished his son to follow in his steps but Comgall wished to become a soldier of Christ. He studied under Finian of Molville and deepened his life of prayer to counteract his temptations to boredom and homesickness. He was persuaded to become a priest and then established a monastery at Bangor around 555-558, which attracted people like Columbanus. He also founded a monastery at Tiree in Scotland. He died after a long illness at Pentecost 602 or 605.

Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels - John 20:19-31:

- 1. 'Peace be with you' was the greeting of Jesus on meeting his frightened apostles. Who has come to you bringing peace at times when you were frightened? For whom have you been an agent of peace?
- 2. Thomas, doubting and questioning, is possibly a person with whom we can identify. What part have doubting and questioning played in your life, on your coming to believe in God and in God's love for you? How has your faith been strengthened by such moments?
- 3. Note the way Jesus dealt with Thomas. He did not give out because he doubted. He took him where he was and led him along to see the truth of his resurrection. Who has been that kind of a teacher for you, gently taking you where you were and leading you on to a deeper knowledge of some truth about life? For whom have you been that kind of teacher?
- 4. 'Blessed are they who have not seen and yet believed.' That requires great trust. Perhaps you have had the experience of being trusted without having had to prove every step along the way. What was it like to be trusted in that way? Who have you been able to trust in a similar manner?

- Q. Why was there a delay of 40 days between the Resurrection and Ascension of the Lord?
- A. According to the Acts of the Apostles, Jesus continued to show himself alive to them by many demonstrations, telling them about the kingdom of God. It was a period of transition from knowing Jesus by physical recognition to recognising him by faith. We too recognise his presence like the Emmaus disciples in the breaking of bread, like Magdalene in being called by name, like Thomas in touching his wounds, and in the mission of divine forgiveness bestowed on the Church. 'Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

The Deep End - Seeing Is Believing:

'I'll believe that when I see it' is a common reaction to any sort of positive suggestion these days. It was the default response to the promises made by all the candidates in the run-up to our general election earlier this year. Reform our health system? Reduce the dole queues? Cut politicians' expenses and pensions? We'll believe it when we see it! We don't take anyone's word for it anymore.

Thomas certainly wasn't willing to take the word of the other disciples when they said they had seen Jesus. He was understandably skeptical, as one tends to be when everything they had placed their hope in has been swept away. Unless he can see and touch his wounds, he will not believe that Jesus has made good on his promises to return. 'Unless I see ... I refuse to believe,' states our doubting Thomas. I'll believe it when I see it. We know what it's like to have lost faith. Like Thomas, our trust has been shaken; like the disciples huddled in the room, we are in fear. We have lost faith in our political system, and many of us have also lost faith in our church. We are all at sea, afraid of what the future will bring.

Jesus greets his disciples with the simple blessing: 'Peace be with you'. In their fear and despair, he came and stood among them. May our troubled hearts know the peace and joy of encountering the risen Christ.
