Michael Canny ADM St. Eugene's Cathedral has asked that the following document be published in this week's Parish Newsletter:</li> <li>Derry Diocese Child Protection Annual Update</li> <li>A lot of work has been accomplished in the area of Child Protection in the Diocese over the past number of years due to the commitment of personnel at all levels in the diocese from the Bishop through to dedicated Parish Representatives working on the ground in all parishes.</li> <li>The Diocese of Derry continues to put in place those structures, personnel policies and procedures that will try to ensure the protection and welfare of children and young people in a manner consistent with statutory requirements and Church guidelines. In the light of the teaching of the Church, Civil Legislation and Guidance, every part of the Church community must be committed to taking the necessary steps to: <ul> <li>Demonstrate that the right of the child to protection from harm is paramount.</li> <li>Cherish and safeguard children and young people</li> <li>Foster best practice</li> <li>Support Church organizations and personnel in safeguarding children</li> <li>Establish safe recruitment and vetting practices – aimed at preventing those who pose a risk to children from holding positions of trust.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Maintain codes of behaviour – having clear guidelines that set out what is and is not acceptable behaviour as an essential part of keeping children safe.</li> <li>The Diocese now has a Child Protection Committee, Diocesan Co-ordinator, 2 Diocesan Trainers and a network of Parish Representatives.</li> <li>The trainers deliver information on "best practice" and raise awareness of child protection issues; they also provide support to parishes within the Diocese. In turn the Parish Representatives.</li> <li>Notices are displayed in our churches which include the Diocesan Policy Statement, contact numbers for statutory authorities for anyone with a concern in relation to child protection or who wish to make an allegatio</li></ul>

US Ordination Class of 2009 Exhibits Cultural Diversity - Survey Shows Correlation of Catholic

**Education and Priestly Vocations:** The U.S. ordination class of 2009 shows diversity in culture and background, including converts and men of all careers and ages, a survey reported. The U.S. bishops' conference recently reported the results from a national survey of priestly candidates, which was commissioned by the prelates and conducted by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate, a Georgetown University-based research center. Cardinal Sean O'Malley of Boston, chairman of the conference's Committee on Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations, observed: "These new priests reflect a tremendous dedication to the Church and show great promise. They reflect God's blessing on our Church."

Of the 2009 class, 11% are Asian, 12% are Hispanic, 3% are African American and 72% are Caucasian. These include 6% from Vietnam, 2% from the Philippines, 5% from Mexico and 1% from Colombia.

A quarter of the ordinands were born outside the country, with the largest numbers coming from Mexico, Vietnam, Poland and the Philippines. The average age for the class is 36, with a range between 25 and 66 years of age. One in ten of the men converted to Catholicism later in life, on average at age 21. They converted from diverse Protestant traditions, and five of them were raised without a faith tradition. Several ordinands have brothers who are already ordained priests. Education: Speaking of the 465 ordinands reported by theologates, houses of formation, dioceses and religious institutes, Cardinal O'Malley continued: "Those who formed them in the faith both in their families and schools can be proud of their efforts. The Lord planted the seeds of their vocations, and the surrounding community helped them grow." Over half of the potential priests reported attending Catholic elementary school, which is a higher rate than that of all U.S. Catholic adults. The ordinands are also more likely than other adult members of the Church to have attended a Catholic high school and college. Of the seminarians who had some college education before beginning their priestly training, 75% attended a Catholic college or university, compared to 7% of the entire adult Catholic population in the country. Two-thirds of the class had full-time work experience before entering the seminary, with a variety of careers including attorneys, farmers, teachers, computer programmers, businessmen, policemen, doctors & politicians Online Survey report (*usccb.org/vocations/classof2009*/

## Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels – John 10: 11-18:

- 1. There is a qualitative difference between a casual acquaintance and a relationship characterised by understanding and care. What changes have you experienced in your relationships as your love and knowledge of the other increased? What was it like for you to experience that change?
- 2. The good shepherd 'lays down his life for the sheep'. When has your care for another led you to 'lay down your life' for that person, e.g., as a friend, parent, spouse, son or daughter? When you have known another to do this for you?
- 3. Jesus speaks of the freedom of the Good Shepherd in laying down his life. Faced with the needs of others, we can at times feel trapped into looking after them, caught by duty, obligation or guilt. We can become like the hired hands that do a job without care for the person. Perhaps you have experienced both attitudes, caring for others under duress and by free choice. What difference did it make when you chose to care for the other, even in circumstances where you had little option?
- 4. What do these experiences of love and care in human relationships reveal to you about God's love for you?

## Questions people ask:

- Q. Every now and then I think I have a vocation from God to be a priest. What should I do about it?
- A. Talk about it to a priest, preferably one who knows you, and pray to the Holy Spirit for guidance. Every diocese and religious order organises Vocation Days to help people to discern their calling. A vocation to priesthood is a grace given to an individual for the service of the church-community. Basic requirements of a genuine vocation to priesthood would include a desire to commit one's life to God and the service of people, a sound faith, regular Mass attendance and prayer, the ability to co-operate with others and being willing to obey authority.

## The Deep End – All-Enfolding:

Today's Gospel reading (John 10:11-18) has Jesus saying something rather intriguing: 'I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd' (v 16). Two things here are surprising. First, Jesus claims ownership over other 'sheep' without saying who they are, or whether they know they are his. Are these Jews or Gentiles? Is this claim valid today? If it is, whom does it include: those of other religions, those of none?

Second, the sequence of events is surprising: 'I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice' (when I do so?). You would expect that they listen first, and then follow. But no! Jesus leads; the listening follows. How should we view the Church's mission in the light of this understanding of what Jesus says? Well, it means that wherever mission goes God is there already. There is no such thing as a 'God-less' people, or a 'God-forsaken' place. We have to acknowledge that in God's sight, if not in ours, 'others' are in the fold. They may not know this, but we should. Consequently, basic to mission is the task of making people aware of Jesus bringing them into the fold.

Then follows mission's second task: enabling those in the fold, newcomers and those of long-standing alike, to listen to Jesus' voice through hearing his word. Consequently, familiarity with his word on the part of those on mission is essential. Otherwise, whose voice will they be listening to?
