What is a week of Guided Prayer?

- It is a way of making a retreat in the midst of your busy life.
- The retreat is scripture based.
- Participants spend some time at home each day reflecting on a chosen passage of scripture, thinking about how it speaks to them in their present life situation.
- Retreatants then come along to reflect with their trained Prayer Guide, in the Pastoral Centre, at a time chosen
 to suit each person taking part.
- A different passage of scripture is usually given each day.
- The week begins on a Sunday evening with a group meeting, to explain how the week will work, and to look at some ideas about praying the Scripture, and to introduce each participant to their personal Prayer Guide.
- One-to-one sessions are arranged to suit each individual, from Monday Thursday, and will last no more than half an hour.
- On Friday evening everyone comes together again to bring the week's experience to a prayerful close, and to celebrate.

St. Ciaran (Abbot) [512-545] Was born in Roscommon and came to Clonmacnoise in January, 545 where he founded a monastery which was to become one of the most renowned in Europe. He died at the age of thirty-three while the monastery was still being built.

Blessed Frank Ozanam [1813-1853] A professor of law at Lyons and later professor of literature at the Sorbonne in Paris. As a student he formed a Conference of Charity which became the Society of St. Vincent de Paul.

Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels - Matthew 18: 15-20:

- 1. At the time Matthew was writing his Gospel local church communities would have numbered no more than fifty people. They would be known to one another. Matthew presents the instructions of Jesus for dealing with people whose behaviour disrupted and harmed the community. Note the steps suggested. Simple directions but many of us do otherwise. We avoid difficult confrontations. We talk about the faults of others to everyone but themselves. We go over the head of someone who displeases us and make complaints. In your experience, which approach is life-giving for you and for others?
- 2. As individuals and communities we have the power to bind and to loose, to exclude people from relationship, or to open up and include others in relationship. When have you found it important to acknowledge this power in your own life?
- 3. There is great assurance in the promise of Jesus in v.19, but he seems to promise more than we experience. Do you believe that God loves you and wants only what is best for you? What has been your experience of trusting in that praying with others for something you wanted God to grant?
- 4. Jesus also promises to be with his followers when they gather together. What does that mean to you? How have you experienced the presence of Jesus in his followers gathered together?

- A. Would such a manifestation move people to believe in the sense of committing themselves in mind and heart to God? The Deep End – Made for Each Other:

'Turning the front door knob, it came to him that maybe he could sponge away the look of loneliness that he'd seen in Susan's eyes – and John was now pretty sure it was loneliness he'd seen, despite the smiles and the confidences. If he'd learned one thing while he'd been away, it was that loneliness and the open discussion of loneliness is the most taboo subject in the world. Forget sex or politics or religion. Or even failure. Loneliness is what clears out a room' – Douglas Coupland, Miss Wyoming. Many of us have experienced loneliness at one time or another. We hear a lot of talk these days about a modern sense of loneliness and isolation, in spite of advancements in mobile technology and the growth of online communities. Yet relationships are at the heart of who we are as human beings. The Gospel of Matthew begins and ends with reassurances that we are not alone. At the beginning we are told the one who is coming will be called Emmanuel, meaning 'God is with us', and it concludes with the words of Jesus 'I am with you always, to the very end of the age'. And here in the middle we have Jesus' assurance: 'Where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them.' Today's Gospel speaks to us about relationships, and lets us know that God is with us in and through our relationships with other people – when we gather in his name, he is there too.

Missalettes may include a changed lead-in by the priest to a changed congregational response e.g. the invitation to Holy Communion or the Congregational Card, published by Veritas, may be the best option. This card contains all the changes that affect the congregation. If a parish produces its own congregational aid copyright permissions and ecclesiastical authorisation should be respected.

Missalettes vary in style and content and may not provide what is needed on a Sunday Again, the Congregational Card or equivalent will be helpful.

The changes apply to weekday celebrations of Mass from September At these Masses, a congregational card will be vital. It is important to make plans for occasions when there are larger numbers in attendance, for example, at a Funeral Mass. Some of the difficulties in these circumstances will be lessened as those who are regular church goers become familiar with the changes.

New music is provided One mark of the new edition of the Missal is the high profile given to music. A collection of new settings, Sing the Mass, was launched at the Irish Church Music Association summer school. Also included will be some familiar Mass settings modified for the changes in the new edition of the Missal. Music is a powerful way of introducing texts with changes and parishes should begin to learn some of the new settings. Sr Perpetua Mc Nulty has prepared a new approved setting and this is being promoted with musicians and singers in the Diocese.

Changes in the Mass texts affect other liturgies The most obvious change is the response 'and with your spirit,' replacing 'and also with you.' This change can be made without raising difficulties. In the Rite of Communion for the Sick, someone who is housebound may well see saying the new version of 'Behold the Lamb of God . . .' and 'Lord, I am not worthy . . .' as expressing their unity with the parish community which is using the new wording.

First Sunday of Advent (27th November) It is our understanding that the new edition of the Missal will be available from late August published by Veritas in two editions, an alter edition and a smaller 'oratory edition.' Full use of the
