

Installation of Bishop Donal McKeown: This afternoon, as the faith-family of the Diocese of Derry, we will welcome our new bishop when Dr. Donal McKeown is installed in St. Eugene's Cathedral at 3.00pm. Greencastle parish will be represented at the ceremony by Alice Keenan (sacristan at St. Patrick's Church), Ann McDermott (sacristan at Our Lady of the Wayside Church) and parish priest Fr. Eugene Hasson.

Bishop McKeown's biography is published on the internet at Wikipedia as follows:

He was born on 12 April 1950 in Belfast and baptised in St. Patrick's Church in Donegall Street, though his childhood was spent in Randalstown, County Antrim.

He was educated at Mount St Michael's Primary School and St MacNissi's College, Garron Tower where he was a boarder from 1961–1968. He completed his O-Levels and A-Levels with special distinction in Modern Languages. Two of his teachers were his future brother Bishops, Fr Anthony Farquhar (who taught Latin) and Fr Patrick Walsh (who taught Mathematics).

He entered the Diocesan Seminary, Saint Malachy's College, in 1968, and studied at Queen's University, Belfast, where he obtained a Bachelor's Degree with Honours in German and Italian in 1973. From 1970 to 1971 he taught English at a school in Dieburg Germany. From 1971–73 he was Northern Ireland correspondent for the German Katholische Nachrichten Agentur (KNA). Then from 1973 to 1978 he studied at the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome, obtaining the degree of Licentiate in Sacred Theology. During the five years in Rome he did occasional work as a newscaster for the Vatican Radio and as correspondent for An Saol Mor, an Irish language programme on RTÉ, the Irish national radio station.

After ordination to the priesthood in 1977, he was briefly chaplain at Mater Infirmorum Hospital in Belfast. In 1978 he began a 23-year career as a teacher. He was appointed to teach Religious Education, and German at St. Patrick's College, Knock (1978–83) while assisting at the same time in the parish of Derriaghy. In 1983 he was appointed as a Teacher at his alma mater St MacNissi's College, Garron Tower. He continued his involvement with youth programmes and is credited as the founder of the Diocesan Lourdes Youth Team in 1985.

Bishop Cahal Daly then appointed him to teach full-time at St. Malachy's College, Belfast in 1987 and also to be in charge as Dean of the Seminary which was situated in St Malachy's. In 1995 he succeeded Canon Noel Conway as President of St. Malachy's College. He twice ran the full Belfast Marathon – 1982 with a team of 48 the parish of Derriaghy and as Bishop in 2001 in an attempt to raise money for a minibus for St Malachy's.

While in the post of President, Fr McKeown continued his own education, taking a Masters Degree in Business Administration specialising in educational management from the University of Leicester in 2000.

On 22 February 2001, Very Rev Donal McKeown was appointed Titular Bishop of Cell Ausaille and Auxiliary Bishop in The Diocese of Down and Connor. His Episcopal Motto is 'Veritas in Caritate', the truth in love.

The episcopal ordination of Dr McKeown took place in Saint Peter's Cathedral, Belfast. Patrick Walsh, Bishop of Down and Connor, was the Principal Consecrator. He was assisted by Dr Giuseppe Lazzarotto, Apostolic Nuncio to Ireland and Dr Anthony Farquhar, Auxiliary Bishop in Down and Connor. Bishop Walsh said during the homily that the consecration of his new auxiliary was an historic occasion. He said, "In fact you make history as you are the first bishop to be ordained for an Irish diocese in this millennium".

The Ordination Mass was celebrated in the presence of Cahal Daly, Cardinal Archbishop Emeritus of Armagh, Desmond Connell, Cardinal Archbishop of Dublin and Seán Brady, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland.

He is currently a member of the Irish Bishops' Conference. He is a member of its Committee on Education and Chairman of the Vocations and Youth Committee. He led the Diocese Youth to World Youth Day in 2002 (Toronto) and 2005 (Cologne). He was one of the bishops who travelled to Rome for their Quinquennial Visit Ad Limina visit in October 2006.

He is a regular contributor on the BBC Radio Ulster Thought for the Day programme.

In February 2014, Bishop McKeown was appointed by Pope Francis to lead the Roman Catholic Diocese of Derry. Bishop McKeown welcomed his appointment saying "I look forward to working with people of faith and people of doubt within this wonderful and historic diocese, so that together we can generate hope for our young people. I feel energized by this challenge. I look forward to working with you as we remember the past and confidently face the future with Christ as our constant friend and guide".

Bishop McKeown, who is due to be installed in St Eugene's Cathedral in Derry on April 6, added that he loved female company but of marriage he said "it was not my vocation". Bishop McKeown has wide experience of second-level education in Northern Ireland, having been a teacher from 1978 until he became president at St. Malachy's College in Belfast in 1995. He retained that post until he was appointed Auxiliary Bishop of the diocese in 2001. In the event Noel Treanor succeeded Dr Walsh.

In addition to English and Irish, Bishop McKeown can speak fluently German, Italian, as well as strong French and Polish.

This Week's Calendar of Feasts and Saints:

- Monday 7th April – St. John the Baptist de la Salle (priest) [1651-1719]** Devoted his life to the care and education of poor children and to the training of teachers. Formed his companions into the Brothers of the Christian Schools. Patron Saint of teachers.
- Friday 11th April – St. Stanislaus of Szczepanów (bishop and martyr)** Became bishop of Krakow, Poland in 1072. His outspoken condemnation of corruption resulted in his murder in 1097.
- Sunday 13th April – St. Martin I (pope and martyr)** Died in 655 from harsh treatment in exile and prison. [Not celebrated this year]

Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels – John 11:1-45: *John Byrne OSA (john@orlagh.ie)*

1. Martha and Mary were people of faith but Jesus led them to an even deeper faith. Who were the people who led you to a deeper faith in Jesus? Remember them and give thanks.
2. Martha and Mary were struggling to come to terms with their bereavement. What has helped you in similar situations?
3. The concern of Jesus is palpable and touching. Recall those who matter to you and to whom you matter. Such love mediates God's love, which surpasses human love with the gift of new life and Easter joy.
4. One can imagine Lazarus as a symbol of people and groups that are written off as dead (sometimes by themselves), and yet through faith come back to life again. Have you had the experience of being revived by faith? Has faith helped to free you from what held you in bondage, or was destructive of your life?

The Deep End – Out of the Depths: *Triona Doherty, Athlone, Co. Roscommon (trionad@gmail.com)*

Little miracles happen all the time. Those magical words 'It's a miracle' can be exclaimed at anything from a friend showing up on time to a loved one getting the all-clear from an illness; from an out-of-the-ordinary, happy event to something which cannot be explained by logic or science.

We often pray for miracles. Sometimes we pray for a specific thing – for a sick person to get better, for example. One prayer to St Anthony acknowledges: 'The answer to my prayer may require a miracle; even so, you are the Saint of Miracles.' Other times we try to surrender our needs and worries to the will of God – every time we pray the Our Father we say 'Thy will be done'.

We know what it is like to hope for a miracle. So we understand the worry of Mary and Martha in today's Gospel when they send for Jesus with the message that Lazarus is ill. We feel the pain in their accusation after Jesus arrives: 'If you had been here, my brother would not have died'. Today's Gospel recounts a big miracle, and it tells us that everything is possible to God. It calls us to a deeper faith, both in what God can do for us, and in his promise of eternal life. The name Lazarus comes from the Hebrew El'azar, meaning 'God has helped'. If we are in need, we can turn to God with the words of today's Psalm:

Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord,
Lord, hear my voice!
O let your ears be attentive
to the voice of my pleading.

Guidelines on Use of Modern Technology when Working with Children: - Use of photography and video
The use of photography and video is an issue of great concern among those working with children. The Diocese recognises that every parish has their own arrangements in relation to its use in schools, youth groups and for the sacraments however the guidelines have been devised below to aid parishes and diocesan groups:

- It is always good practice to seek *written* permission from a parent or guardian before taking any photographs or video footage of children. This written permission must be sought from the parent/guardian or the person who owns the photograph before it can be displayed on promotional materials or websites. This can be incorporated in the registration form when a child joins a group (template permission Resource 10);
- Neither names nor any personal information should be displayed alongside any photographs;
- Special consideration should be given where taking photographs or video footage might be misinterpreted, or the images could be seen as provocative (e.g. beach trip or gymnastics display etc.). It is not to say, however, that with the right planning, these events cannot be recorded and enjoyed.
- Photography and video recording are important methods of recording social activity and providing an historic record – illustrating and validating important moments in people's lives. This process is a powerful and personal one, and therefore we must respect the rights of all to make the choice whether or not to be photographed.

Sometimes it's hard to let go of things. Ronald Rolheiser tells the story of a peasant from Crete who appeared at the heavenly gates, reluctant to leave his beloved land behind. He even brought some of its soil with him, tightly clenched in his hand. Saint Peter tells him that he can only enter if he leaves the handful of Cretan soil behind, something he is unwilling to do. Only when a young child approaches, holding out her hand to accompany him, does he inadvertently release his grip on the soil. And entering heaven, he is astonished to find waiting for him... all of Crete!

The sentences following the rules are Jay Keenan's comments from his perspective as an Engaged Encounter leader with his wife Suzanne.
NO NAME CALLING	This includes using affectionate names sarcastically
NO THIRD PARTIES	The argument is between the two of you
NO PAST HISTORY	If it's already been settled, don't bring it up again
STICK TO THE SUBJECT	Identify the real problem — don't go to other issues
NO CHEAP SHOTS	Don't use the other's weakness to gain advantage; you may win the argument, but injure your relationship

Francis – It is Hard for the Corrupt to Turn Back: *Vatican City (27th March, 2014) [VIS]*

The dialogue between God's lament and man's justifications was the theme selected by the Holy Father in the homily he pronounced at this morning's Mass in St. Peter's Basilica, attended by Italian ministers and members of parliament. Pope Francis spoke about the infidelity of the People of God, a generation that does not accept His messages, and in their place, seek justifications for their sins. "It was a very great task to drive idolatry from the hearts of his people, to make them docile to His Word. But they followed this route for a little while, before turning back".

"From being sinners, they went on to become corrupt", he continued. "It is very hard for a corrupt person to turn back. The sinner, yes, because the Lord is merciful and awaits us all. But the corrupt are fixed on their affairs, and these people were corrupt. They therefore sought to justify themselves, because Jesus, with his simplicity, but with his strength in God, made trouble for them. And, step by step, they ended up convincing themselves that they had to kill Jesus, and one of them said, 'It is better for a man to die for the people'".

"These people had taken the wrong path. They resisted the salvation of the Lord's love, and drifted from faith, from a theology of faith to a theology of duty: 'You must do this, this and this ...'. Describing them as hypocrites, Jesus said, "They tie up heavy, cumbersome loads and put them on other people's shoulders, but they themselves are not willing to lift a finger to move them'. They rejected the Lord's love and this rejection set them on a path that was not the dialectic of freedom offered by the Lord, but that of the logic of necessity, where there is no room for the Lord. ... They have become 'behavioural': men of good manners, but with bad habits. Jesus called them 'whitewashed sepulchres'. This is the Lord's pain, God's pain, God's lament".

Pope Francis mentioned that during Lent "we would do well to think about the invitation from the Lord to love, and to ask ourselves, all of us: am I on this path? Or do I risk justifying myself and taking another path? A road with many junctions that does not, however, lead to any promise. ... And we pray that the Lord gives us the grace to always follow the path of salvation, to open ourselves to the salvation that comes only from God, through faith, not that which is proposed to us by these 'professionals of duty' who had lost the faith and who led their people with this pastoral theology of duty".
