To Raise the World: The first reading is about the call of Isaiah: *Whom shall I send?* The next two readings are about the apostles, those who were sent by Jesus to carry his message and carry on his work. Who are Jesus' apostles in our world? Whom will God send today?

When God wants to send a message of love to the outcasts of this world, who will say *Here I am; send me!* When God wants someone to speak out in the halls of government on behalf of the voiceless, who will say *Here I am; send me!*

When all the world marches out to war and God needs someone to march in the opposite direction, a messenger of peace, who will say *Here I am; send me!*

As the world suffers from the ill effects of the injustice it has caused, and the Church offers a way out through its social teaching, where are the Catholics who will bring that message to the world? Who will say *Here I am; send me!*

The Christian calling has to do with what is known in Catholic social thought as the common good. Watch over your family and keep us safe in your care.

Christians are called to work for the good of the human family. It is an urgent task, requiring people who have a sense of God's justice and are committed to peacemaking.

Whom will God send?

"We are all struggling to raise the world to a condition of greater justice, more stable peace, more sincere cooperation. We invite all of you and encourage you, from the humblest who are the underpinning of nations to heads of state responsible for each nation — we encourage you to build up an efficacious and responsible structure for a new order, one more just and honest." *Pope John Paul I (message of Sunday 27th August, 1978)*

This Week's Calendar of Saints:

Monday 8th February – St. Jerome Emiliani After a military career he founded the Clerks Regular of Sanmaschi for the care of orphans and the poor. Patron saint of orphans. Died in 1537. St. Josephine Bakhita (1868 – 1947) A native of Sudan, brought as a slave to Italy where she became a Christian and later a nun in Venice.
 Wednesday 10th February – St. Scholastica Sister of St. Benedict. She spent her life as a consecrated virgin, Patron of convulsive children. Died in 543.
 Thursday 11th February – Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes On this day in 1858, Our Lady first appeared to the 14 year old Bernadette Soubirous. Later Bernadette was to learn that the mysterious lady was the Blessed Virgin and to hear from her lips "I am the Immaculate Conception". In 1992 Pope John Paul II instituted the World Day of the Sick to be held on the commemoration of Our Lady of Lourdes.

St. Gobnait (virgin) One of the best loved saints in West Cork but only traditions concerning her life survive. The main part of her life was spent in Ballyvourney, Co. Cork, where there has always been a deep devotion to her, and which is a place of pilgrimage on this day and on Pentecost. Her gifts of caring for and curing the sick have been a significant part of her cult through the centuries. Happily her memorial coincides with the World Day for the Sick.

Questions people ask:

Q. What does holy mean?

A. I consider holy to be one of the most expressive words in the English language. It is a word that comes up from the depths of the lungs, expressing a sigh for the infinite God who is over all, beyond all and within all. When Peter saw the power of Jesus manifested in the huge haul of fish, he experienced the otherness or holiness of God in contrast to his own frailty or sinfulness. Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels – *Luke 5:1-11*:

- 1. Simon responded to the invitation from Jesus to put out the net again, with surprising results. Have there been times when you had little hope of results, but decided to try once again and were pleasantly surprised by what happened?
- 2. 'Put out into the deep water.' When have you found that blessings, or progress, came when you had the courage to venture into unfamiliar waters, where you felt uneasy and insecure? What, or who, helped to give you that courage?
- 3. Simon had a profound sense of a power at work that he could not understand. When have you had a sense of the divine breaking into everyday experience?
- 4. The disciples 'left everything and followed Jesus'. This step was preceded by their experience of the concern of Jesus for them, the attraction of his work, teaching and actions. Recall the story of key decisions or turning points in your life. Who was Jesus for you in those situations?

The Deep End – In the Dark:

When it comes to energy and matter we're in the dark. Satellite images of leftover energy from the Big Bang show things as they were 400,000 years after the Bang. To put that into perspective: it means seeing something as it was 13 billion years ago. Analysing their findings, scientists have discovered that only 4.6 percent of the total universe is made of stuff we can see. The rest, in the form of dark matter and dark energy, is invisible and mystifying. Dark matter holds our galaxies together; dark energy drives them apart. Their interaction means that while there won't be more matter in the universe there will be more space – lots more. So much more that neighbouring galaxies will disappear into the void. We'll find ourselves even more cosmically isolated than we already are. Something to look forward to! Better to look forward to what God's word promises. God's image in today's First Reading (Isa 6:1-8) shows him as majestic and transcendent. Yet God cares for his people. He sends Isaiah on a mission to them. This mighty God, for whom our Big Bang was neither big nor a bang, cares for his creation. A cold and lonely universe is not part of his plan for us.

Couldn't be since he sends his son to us later. As the seraphs cover their faces before the majesty of God in that First Reading so too does Peter as he falls before Jesus' knees in awe in the Gospel reading. (Luke 5:1-11) Take your pick: dark matter, dark future; glorious God, glorious future.
