## The Deep End – Shattered:

In his 'Hymn of the Universe' (p. 24) Teilhard de Chardin prays: "Shatter, my God, through the daring of your revelation the childishly timid outlook that can conceive of nothing greater or more vital in the world than the pitiable perfection of our human organism". Today's First Reading (1 Kings 19:9, 11-13) and the Gospel (Matt 14:22-33) put me in mind of that prayer. They shatter the dubious certainties of small minds. They shatter the shaky security of a mind trapped inside predictable parameters, bound by the banal, fearful of the unknown, unable to probe the eternal. Those two readings come with thoughts and imagery nearly too powerful to comprehend and too incredible to accept.

You have Elijah meeting God at Horeb. And how does God appear? In a mighty rock-splitting wind? No. In a terrifying earthquake? No. In a ferocious fire? No. But in the most unlikely sound of sheer silence (19:12 NRSV). When the clutter goes. God comes.

Then in the Gospel reading you have Jesus walking on water, another epiphany of God's presence in the creation of calm. The imagery of Psalm 107:29 is used here: he made the storm be still, and the waves of the seas were hushed. When the noise and turmoil stops Gods presence begins to be felt.

This is the something greater and more vital that Teilhard prayed for: the realisation that God is never far away, but is active within his creation, and for a purpose. Only an outlook shattered by revelation can hope to grasp its implications.

#### This Week's Calendar of Saints:

**Monday 11**th – St. Clare, virgin. Clare, born in Assisi in 1193, died in 1253. She followed St. Francis in his life of poverty and was founder of the Poor Clares. She is the patron saint of television.

**Tuesday 12**th – St. Jane Frances de Chantal (1572-1641). At the age of twenty she married Baron de Chantal but after nine years she was left a widow with four children. Her friendship with St. Francis de Sales led to the foundation of the Congregation of the Visitation.

**Wednesday 13**th – Saints Pontian, pope, and Hippolytus, priest, both martyrs. Pontius became bishop of Rome in 230 but was exiled in Sardinia where he abdicated during persecution in 235. Hippolytus was a Roman priest. Both died of ill treatment and are honoured as martyrs.

**Thursday 14**th – St. Maximilian Kolbe, priest and martyr. Maximilian (1894-1941) was a Conventional Franciscan who worked in the apostolate of the press in Poland and Japan, he died in Auschwitz. **Friday 15**th – THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY. This feast honours the fullness of

blessedness that was Mary's destiny, the glorification of her immaculate soul and virginal body that completely conformed her to the risen Christ. Today is the patronal day of France, India, Malta and Paraguay.

**Saturday 16**<sup>th</sup> – St. Stephen of Hungary. Stephen (975-1038) first king of Hungary and its patron saint, worked for the conversion of his people to Christianity.

## Questions people ask:

- **Q.** I like to go to Knock every year but my son insists that these apparitions are hallucinations or imaginary voices. How can I answer him?
- A. The best test of any alleged apparition is what Jesus said: By their fruits you shall know them. Here are three tests: Is the teaching in accord with scripture and sound faith? Does it strengthen and improve the moral life of people? Is there evidence here of Gods healing power? Knock passes on all three criteria. The apparition there is a deep, silent contemplation of the sacrifice of Jesus, Lamb of God, in the company of Mary and the saints.
