- Q. Do you agree that the Mass nowadays lacks reverence which would be restored by going back to Latin?
- A. The spirit of reverence is absolutely essential to good liturgy. There are celebrations where the celebrant shows deep reverence in his gestures and words, is properly vested, and music and readings light up the Word of the Lord. Sadly, there are also liturgies lacking due reverence. But it is not simply a question of language. I grew up with the Latin Mass when prayers were mumbled, readings not understood, multiple blessings were performed like swatting flies from the chalice while people said the rosary or gathered in utter boredom at the back of the church. Back to Latin? No thank you!

Now the Scouts: The following statement about perpetrators of the crimes of sexual abuse may sound familiar to Catholics: "That was a different time.... That was a time when people thought—the medical community thought—there was a potential for rehabilitation." This is not a bishop apologising for a priest.

It is Wayne Perry, the president of the Boy Scouts of America, apologising after the release of a cache of documents detailing accusations of abuse of "many thousands of victims," according to The New York Times, allegedly committed by 1,247 scout leaders between 1965 and 1985. The parallels between the Catholic Church and the Boy Scouts are striking. Both of these institutions were seen as moral institutions charged with caring for children; both were organised in clear-cut hierarchies; and both instinctively tried to prevent the documents from being released. The B.S.A. called these records the "perversion files."

The terrible revelations about the scouts, however, do not let the Catholic Church off the hook. Nor do they let Penn State off the hook. Child abuse occurs in a variety of settings; families, schools, social service agencies—

Penn State off the hook. Child abuse occurs in a variety of settings: families, schools, social service agencies—indeed any setting that includes children. Even organisations that do not deal directly with children are prone to cover-ups: the British Broadcasting Company is embroiled in a case of ignoring the abuse of hundreds of young girls by a popular television host. The scope of these crimes points to the need for greater vigilance, continued transparency and further education about sexual abuse. The Catholic Church has made great strides in the prevention of abuse, but much work remains. In the future, the "perversion files" of every organisation should be empty.

Guidelines on Use of Modern Technology when Working with Children: - Use of photography and video

The use of photography and video is an issue of great concern among those working with children. The Diocese recognises that every parish has their own arrangements in relation to its use in schools, youth groups and for the sacraments however the guidelines have been devised below to aid parishes and diocesan groups:

- It is always good practice to seek written permission from a parent or quardian before taking any photographs or video footage of children. This written permission must be sought from the parent/quardian or the person who owns the photograph before it can be displayed on promotional materials or websites. This can be incorporated in the registration form when a child joins a group (template permission Resource
- Neither names nor any personal information should be displayed alongside any photographs;
- Special consideration should be given where taking photographs or video footage might be misinterpreted, or the images could be seen as provocative (e.g. beach trip or gymnastics display etc.). It is not to say, however, that with the right planning, these events cannot be recorded and enjoyed.
- Photography and video recording are important methods of recording social activity and providing an historic record - illustrating and validating important moments in people's lives. This process is a powerful and personal one, and therefore we must respect the rights of everyone to make the choice whether or not to be The notice comes from the Safeguarding Policy and Procedures photographed. and is published on behalf of the Diocesan Safeguarding Committee

Wednesday 14th November - St. Laurence O'Toole (bishop) [1128-1180] Lorcán Ua Tuathail, also known as St. Laurence O'Toole, was born at Castledermot, Kildare, Ireland and died at Eu, Normandy, France, he was canonised in 1225 by Pope Honorius III..

Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels – Mark 12:38-44:

- The scribes are presented as ostentatious and devious, acting more out of self-interest than the love of God or people. There can be a element of self-interest in each of us. Perhaps there have been times when you have been disturbed by alimpsing in yourself 'other motives' in your doing good. Recall when you were awakened to this fact. Where was the good news for you in that awakening?
- In material terms what the widow had to offer was very little. Recall when you felt yourself called to give and gave even though you apparently had very little. Perhaps you have had the experience of finding that what you thought was little and insignificant meant a great deal to another person. Recall some of those moments.
- The widow 'gave everything she had, all she had to live on'. In doing so she placed herself in a very vulnerable position, trusting that things would work out. Have you ever found that what seemed a generous but reckless giving of yourself proved life-giving for yourself and others?

The Deep End - On the Breadline:

An artwork by German artist Fritz Eichenberg entitled Jesus in the breadline depicts Jesus waiting in line for food, among the poor.

The black and white wood carving shows Jesus standing alone and in apparent silence, head bowed, among a group of men and women, who pull their garments around them to warm themselves as they stand in line. A halo - or it could be the moon - surrounds Jesus' head, its light bouncing off the clothes of those around him and illuminating the background.

The piece reminds us of Jesus' tendency to walk with the poor and those who were outcast or marginalised. On many occasions in the Gospels. Jesus is seen to spend time with the 'least' of the people in society, and he often holds the poorest and most humble people up as an example. On the other hand, he has little time for those who put on an outward show, or who elevate themselves to positions of importance.

It should come as no surprise, then, that Jesus shows great empathy and admiration for the poor widow in today's Gospel, who is the opposite of the show-off scribes. When it comes to humility and generosity, she is closest to living out the gospel message of Jesus. 'She, from the little she had, has put in everything she possessed, all she had to live on.'
