

Our Lady of the Wayside, Broughderg St. Patrick's, Greencastle Third Sunday of Advent (Gaudate Sunday) [Year B] (11th December, 2011)





Today is Gaudate Sunday which, taken from the first word of the Entrance Antiphon, means "rejoice." Penitential violet is replaced with rose, a colour of joy. The priest may wear rose vestments; rose may be woven into the liturgical decorations; and the third candle on the Advent wreath (traditionally rose) is lit. Even in the liturgical colours we sense a shift in the lituraies of the season. This shift will be especially noticeable beginning Saturday 17th December, but even today's liturgy gives a hint that something is on the horizon. Possibly dating back to the Middle Ages, when the season of Advent bore an overly penitential character, the rose colours signalled joyfully that the church was closer to Christmas. Although today the rose colour is still a sign of the anticipatory Christmas joy, we understand the continuity of Advent as a season of 'devout iovful expectation.' Today's lituray helps to heighten the expectation, which will carry through to the celebration of Christmas.

The 50th International Eucharistic Congress 2012: This will take place in Dublin from 10th to 17th June under the theme 'The Eucharist: Communion with Christ and with one another' and expects 25,000 pilgrims to participate each day, both from Ireland and from overseas.

It is an international gathering of people, which aims to promote an awareness of the central place of the Eucharist in the life and mission of the Catholic Church; help improve our understanding and celebration of the liturgy and draw attention to the social dimension of the Eucharist.



These aims are achieved through a programme of pastoral preparation in the years leading up to the Congress and the actual week of the Congress that consists of a programme of Prayer, Eucharist, workshops, discussion groups, catechesis and testimonies, cultural events, a youth space, tours, exhibitions, a Eucharistic Procession, a massive closing ceremony in Croke Park and more. Introduction of the new edition of the Roman Missal:

Posture during Mass: Bishop Hegarty commends the following common posture, as set down in the General Instruction (43) for observation throughout the diocese:

- 1. Standing from the beginning until the end of the Collect;
- 2. Standing from the *Orate Fratres* (pray brothers and sisters...) until the end of the *Sanctus*;
- 3. Standing from Concluding Prayer until the end of Mass.
- 4. The practice of kneeling during the Eucharistic Prayer and Communion is laudably retained.

Silence: Attention is drawn to articles 45 and 56 of the General Instruction which commend the observation of sacred silence at certain times before and during Mass.

- John was 'the voice of one crying out in the wilderness' announcing confidently to those in the wilderness that they must not despair because God's grace will come to them at any moment. Have you had the experience of being in the wilderness, feeling lost? From whom did you hear a voice that gave you hope? Have you been able to give hope to other people when they were in the wilderness?

Samaritans' comment on Jeremy Clarkson's Sun column

Reacting to Jeremy Clarkson's comments in today's Sun newspaper. Catherine Johnstone. Samaritans' Chief Executive said: "The insensitivity of Jeremy Clarkson's comments in his Sun column today about people who die by suicide on the railways truly beggars belief. While purporting to express sympathy for people who die this way, his remarks about their bodies constitute gross intrusion into the grief and shock of bereaved families and friends. "His notion that suicide is a selfish act shows how little he knows about the subject because, if he did, he would know that when a person attempts suicide they are so distressed that they genuinely believe their families will be better off without them. The concept that their actions could be construed as selfish is the furthest thing from their mind. Fortunately, most of us will never experience the mental torture that leads someone to die by suicide. "Furthermore, if Jeremy Clarkson knew anything about suicide he would also know that insensitive media coverage of the subject could trigger so-called 'copycat' deaths. The fact that he has chosen to add fuel to the flames of the comments he made earlier this week on the BBC One Show again beggars belief. It's one thing to joke about people on strike, it's in an entirely different realm of poor taste to joke about suicide. "We have already made a complaint to Ofcom about his remarks on the One Show and we will now be taking up today's comments with the Press Complaints Commission. "We want remind anyone who has been distressed by Clarkson's comments today that Samaritans' volunteers are on hand 24/7 on 08457 90 90 90 to offer support."

This Week's Calendar of Saints and Feasts:

Monday 12th December - St. Finnian (bishop) Studied in Idrone, Co. Carlow and later in Wales, on his return he settled in Clonard, Co. Meath around 520, where he established a famous school. His pupils, among which were Canice, Columcille and Brendan, were initiators of the great monastic expansion in Ireland. Died in 549 and is remembered as the tutor of all the saints of Ireland. Feast not celebrated this year.

> Our Lady of Guadalupe Patron Saint of the Americas. This memorial recalls the apparitions in December, 1531 to Juan Diego Cuahtlatoatzin on Tepeyac Hill, near Mexico City. Mary appeared as a symbol of wisdom and peace. Her image as a *mestiza*. a woman of native American and European heritage, remained in Juan's cloak (tilma). She appeared as "the little brown one," affectionately called La Morenita, who gives great dignity and holiness to the native and mestizo peoples of America. The tilma that Juan Diego presented to his doubtful bishop was filled with roses and is now enshrined in Mexico City in the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Nowhere else does she appear as a pregnant woman as she does here, wearing the blue sash traditionally worn by expectant Aztec women. She also has a flower on her womb, an Aztec symbol of new life and a new era. Blocks the sun and stands on the moon. Feast not celebrated this year.

Tuesday 13th December – St. Lucy (virgin and martyr) Suffered much for her desire to remain consecrated to Christ alone. She was martyred in 304 in Sicily in the persecution of Diocletian. Her name means *light* and her intercession has been sought for eye trouble.

Wednesday 14th December – St. John of the Cross (priest and doctor of the Church) [1542-1591] A Carmelite who, despite opposition and imprisonment, worked for the reform of the Carmelites. He was a man of prayer, an outstanding poet and a spiritual writer. Declared Doctor of the Church.
