Season of Lent: Ash Wednesday (17th February) begins the season of Lent. It is a day of Fast and Abstinence which means that we are asked to make a sacrifice in the food we eat on Wednesday; avoid meat, eat less than usual, avoid foods we love. Traditionally, we also make a sacrifice for the whole season of Lent until Easter by avoiding certain foods or little luxuries like sweets, alcohol, video games etc. On the other hand we might consider doing something constructive, like praying together as a family, taking regular family walks.

Ashes for Ash Wednesday: Each year we gather to receive blessed ashes on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday to signify that we are willing to make some sort of personal sacrifice during Lent. Unfortunately, that is not possible this year. What we propose is to say together our Lenten Commitment Prayer, during which we will promise God to keep the sacrifice we mentally pray during the recitation of the prayer together.

Lenten Commitment Prayer

Father in heaven, I believe that You have committed Yourself to me forever as your child, made in Your image and likeness. On this first day of Lent I wish to commit myself to making some personal sacrifice in my life during this Season of Preparation before the Celebration of our salvation by Your Son, Jesus on the cross on Good Friday. I believe He made that sacrifice for all our sakes so that we can approach You, Father, with an open heart. I now make my Lenten Promise during this silent pause in the quiet of my heart And I seek Your strength and perseverance in this promise. I make it in Your name: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen

Guidelines on Use of Modern Technology when Working with Children - Use of Photography and Video:

The use of photography and video is an issue of great concern among those working with children. The Diocese recognises that every parish has their own arrangements in relation to its use in schools, youth groups and for the sacraments however the guidelines have been devised below to aid parishes and diocesan groups:

- It is always good practice to seek written permission from a parent or guardian before taking any photographs or
 video footage of children. This written permission must be sought from the parent/guardian or the person who
 owns the photograph before it can be displayed on promotional materials or websites. This can be incorporated in
 the registration form when a child joins a group (template permission Resource 10);
- Neither names nor any personal information should be displayed alongside any photographs;
- Special consideration should be given where taking photographs or video footage might be misinterpreted, or the images could be seen as provocative (e.g. beach trip or gymnastics display etc.). It is not to say, however, that with the right planning, these events cannot be recorded and enjoyed.

Photography and video recording are important methods of recording social activity and providing an historic record – illustrating and validating important moments in people's lives. This process is a powerful and personal one, and therefore we must respect the rights of all to make the choice whether or not to be photographed.

17 Parishes in West Tyrone and East Donegal. An estimated Catholic population of 65,670 people are currently served by 20 Derry Diocesan priests under retirement age with assistance of 3 priests in residence and a chaplain to the Polish community.

8 parishes (47%) have a Catholic population of less than 3,000 6 parishes (35%) have a Catholic population of 3,000-7,000 people 3 parishes (18%) have a Catholic population of greater than 7,000 people The largest parish serves an estimated 11,500 Catholics

The Deep End – Stretched Out His Hand:

Jesus, in today's Gospel, cures a leper by the healing touch of his hand. A leper was completely outcasted from society due to the huge stigma surrounding the disease, which was highly contagious but was also seen as a punishment from God in Jesus' time. Jesus is moved with pity for this man and reaches out to him. Jesus sends the man to the priests, as a testimony to them. Jesus' 'pity' also conveys anger at the leper's situation. It is the religious hierarchy of Jesus' time who have alienated this man. What they are incapable of doing (healing him), Jesus has done by 'stretching out his hand' in love.

A question for us from this Gospel today might be, who are those our society outcast? Who is alienated in our communities? What moves you with pity? Who is it that we need to reach out to at this time?

Jesus, in Mark's Gospel, is forever asking people to keep quiet and not tell anyone about what he does. Yet, after such a radical encounter with God which frees this man from all that keeps him trapped, of course he wants to shout from the roof tops. Why would Jesus want his miracles to be kept a secret? Jesus wants to be able to fulfil his mission without attracting the wrong kind of attention. Eventually those who are against him will use encounters like this one to compile evidence against him. For now, the less they know the better. We might think today of those who bravely speak out, even if it means they are punished in some way. May all of us have the courage, like the man who is healed in the Gospel today, to proclaim the truth, even if it costs us.

There is a need for paths of peace to heal open wounds. There is also a need for peacemakers, men and women prepared to work boldly and creatively to initiate processes of healing and renewed encounter.

- 1. Jesus' compassion for people suffering was an outstanding characteristic of his ministry. We see the healing power of God at work through him. Recall times when the compassion of others has had a healing effect on you. Remember also when your compassion towards someone in trouble brought them hope, healing or strength.
- 2. 'If you choose, you can make me clean'. Our choice is a key factor in how we affect others. We cannot choose to have no impact on the people in our lives. Even a choice to do nothing has an effect. When have you been particularly aware of the importance of your choice to be a positive influence on another?
- 3. Lepers were forced to live away from others. The leper's cure meant that he was also readmitted to contact with the community. Perhaps you recall people who were once ostracized being brought back into family or community. Who was the Jesus person who helped this healing to take place?
- 4. The joy of the leper on being healed was such that he could not keep the good news to himself. Bring to mind occasions when you were so filled with good news that you could not keep it to yourself.

This Week's Calendar of Feasts and Saints:

Sunday 14th February - St. Cyril (monk) [826-869] and St. Methodius (bishop) [815-885] (both Patrons of Europe) Brothers from Thessalonica in Greece. They preached the gospel in Moravia using their own translation of the Scriptures and the liturgy in the local language. These translations into Slavonic were in an alphabet, now called Cyrillic, which they devised. They are honoured as apostles of the Slavic peoples and in 1980 Pope John Paul II declared them Patrons of Europe.

Wednesday 17th February - St. Fintan (abbot) Born in Leinster, he received his religious formation in Terryglass Co. Tipperary under the abbot Colum and was deeply influenced by his penitential practices and the severity of the Rule. Fintan made his own foundation in Clonenagh, Co. Laois. He died in 603.

> Seven Founders of the Order of Servites (religious) In the early 13th century seven young merchants of Florence decided to help one another live more perfect Christian lives. As the result of a vision they became known as the 'Servants of Mary' and followed the Rule of St. Augustine.

Sunday 21st February - St. Peter Damian (bishop and doctor of the Church) A reforming monk in The circle of Pope Leo IX and a cardinal. In 1823, he was declared a Doctor of the Church.
