"Faithfulness of Christ, faithfulness of priests" is the theme of the Special Year for Priests announced by the Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI. The Pope will inaugurate the Year on 19<sup>th</sup> June, presiding at Vespers in St. Peter's Basilica where the relics of the saintly 'Cure of Ars' will be brought for the occasion by Bishop Guy Bagnard of Belley-Ars, France. He will close the year on 19<sup>th</sup> June, 2010, presiding at a "World Meeting of Priests" in St. Peter's Square. During the course of the Year, Benedict XVI will proclaim St. Jean Marie Vianney as patron saint of all the priests of the world. A "Directory for Confessors and Spiritual Directors" will also be published, as will a collection of texts by the Supreme Pontiff on essential aspects of the life and mission of priests in our time. A pastoral letter from the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference

We commend the many adults and young people who have chosen to remain abstinent from alcohol until 18 years old or for life.

We encourage people who feel that for them alcohol has become a problem and decide to seek professional help from treatment centres, local health services or support groups in their community.

We commend all the good work which is done by support groups around the country and the many parishes and communities that provide meeting rooms and services for such groups.

What a great legacy and gift it would be for our children if we would be the generation brave enough to promote and work for an attitude and culture of moderation rather than excess in our use of alcohol.

#### Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels - Mark 14:12-26, 22-26:

- 1. The symbolic gesture of Jesus at the Last Supper symbolised the offering of himself that he would make on Calvary, giving his life for others. Sometimes we also are called to give our lives for others. We can do this grudgingly or with a generous heart. What difference has it made for you when you were able to give yourself freely?
- 2. In his encyclical letter Deus Caritas Est Pope Benedict XVI wrote, 'A Eucharist which does not pass over into the concrete practice of love is essentially fragmented'. What has helped you to be aware of the importance of the link between the Eucharist and your lifestyle?
- 3. Jesus involved his disciples both in the preparation for the Last Supper and in its celebration. Recall times when you had a heightened awareness of participation and involvement in the Mass. What helped to give you this awareness? Are there lessons from these experiences that you can bring with you to the Sunday Mass?

### Questions people ask:

- Q. What did Jesus mean by the blood of the new covenant?
- A. The Bible is a library of two testaments. The Old Testament is about God's first covenant with his people, a covenant given through Noah, Abraham and Moses. The New Testament is the documentation of the new covenant, inaugurated by Jesus Christ, by which we are raised up as children of God. Before the time of Jesus, people regularly renewed their side of the covenant by offering blood sacrifices. The new covenant was ratified once and for all in the blood of Jesus, shed on Calvary.

#### Some Facts Regarding the Eucharistic Congress:

The First International Eucharistic Congress was held in Lille (France) in 1881.

Up to the 1920's the Eucharistic Congresses focused primary on the Eucharist itself (liturgy, adoration, real presence, frequent communion etc.).

From the 1920's there was a change of emphasis. While the Sacrament of the Eucharist and the Sacrifice of the Mass remained central to the Congress, there was also a growing emphasis on what it meant to be a Eucharistic people in the particular context of place and time.

The theme of the 1932 Dublin Congress was: The Eucharist and Ireland.

The last two Congresses were held in:

2004 - Guadalahara (Mexico) - The Eucharist: Light and Life of the New Millennium.

2008 – Quebec City (Canada) – The Eucharist: Gift of God for the Life of the World.

The 2012 Congress in Dublin:

- Will be the 50th International Eucharistic Congress
- Will mark the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the inauguration of the Second Vatican Council.

The Pope decides the theme for each Eucharistic Congress, taking into account the recommendations of the theological commission established by the Bishop of the host diocese. We hope to know the theme by late spring or early summer.

Once the theme for the Congress has been decided, a theological commission appointed by Archbishop Diarmuid Martin in consultation with the episcopal conference, will prepare the conference document. This will be a short booklet, which will explore the theme and suggest ways in which it can be developed in the programme of evangelization and catechesis which will take place in each diocese in Ireland, and further afield.

A Congress logo will be designed and a Congress 'hymn' will be prepared to five expression to the theme.

Events at the last International Eucharistic Congress in Quebec included:

A daily celebration of the Eucharist

Talks, reflections and workshops on the meaning of the Eucharist and its implications for Christian living.

A packed lunch shared by 13,000 participants

Choral concerts and plays

Dedicated venues for adoration of the Blessed Sacrament

A gathering place for young people

A Blessed Sacrament procession through the streets of Quebec City

A closing Mass with a telecast from Pope Benedict.

## The Deep End - Not á la Carte:

Johnny got the message early in life. When asked by his religion teacher what he thought of God he replied with a gravity beyond his young years, 'I bet it's very hard for him to love all of everybody in the whole world. There are only four people in our family and I can never do it.' Out of the mouth of babes!

In today's First Reading from the Book of Exodus (24:3-8) the word 'all' is used repeatedly. In brief: all the people promise obedience to *all* the words of the Lord. There's no half measure, no à la carte approach to God's commands. There wasn't then, and there isn't now.

Today we celebrate the feast of The Body and Blood of Christ, or *Corpus Christi* as it's more popularly known. The Eucharist that Christ gave us is a meal open to all people who have committed themselves in faith to Jesus as Saviour.

The Eucharist, while it needs to be celebrated in a manner that expresses life, joy and community, is not an entertainment event. It's joyful yet serious, lively yet dignified and, in a sense, 'ordinary' yet holy.

What we need to realise too, however, is that it also requires effort on our part to prepare for it and further effort to celebrate it well. That's where the 'all' comes in again. We can't prepare for the Eucharist with only part of our life. Following Jesus is a total life-long commitment. How could anyone celebrate Mass on a Sunday, having lived like a pagan on Saturday?
