St. Patrick's, Greencastle Our Lady of the Wayside, Broughderg Third Sunday of Advent (Gaudate) [Year B] (14th December, 2014)



Today is **Gaudate Sunday** which, taken from the first word of the Entrance Antiphon, means "rejoice." Penitential violet is replaced with rose, a colour of joy. The priest may wear rose vestments; rose may be woven into the liturgical decorations; and the third candle on the Advent wreath (traditionally rose) is lit. Even in the liturgical colours we sense a shift in the liturgies of the season. This shift will be especially noticeable beginning Wednesday 17th December, but even today's liturgy gives a hint that something is on the horizon. Possibly dating back to the Middle Ages, when the season of Advent bore an overly penitential character, the rose colours signalled joyfully that the church was closer to Christmas. Although today the rose colour is still a sign of the anticipatory Christmas joy, we understand the continuity of Advent as a season of 'devout joyful expectation.'

Today's liturgy helps to heighten the expectation, which will carry through to the celebration of Christmas.

The Pope Lights the Tallest Christmas Tree in the World

Vatican City (Monday 8th December) IVIS1

Every year on this day in Gubbio, the Italian city where St. Francis tamed the wolf, the tallest Christmas tree in the world is lit up. Situated on the slopes of Mount Ingino, it is made up of dots of light of different types: 250 green dots trace a silhouette more than 650 metres high, which contains more than 300 lights of various colours. It is topped with a star of 1000 square metres, made up of 200 white lights. At dusk on Sunday 7th December, the Holy Father illuminated the tree from the Vatican using a tablet, and he greeted those in attendance in Gubbio.

"In switching on the light of the Nativity scene, we wish for the light of Christ to be in us. A Christmas without light is not Christmas. Let there be light in the soul, in the heart; let there be forgiveness to others; let there be no hostilities, which are dark. Let there be the beautiful light of Jesus. This is my wish for all of you, when you turn on the light of the crib.

"Many thanks for your gift, it is beautiful. Also I give to you my warmest wishes, peace and happiness.

"If you have something dark in your soul, ask the Lord for forgiveness. Christmas is a great opportunity to cleanse the soul. Do not fear, the priest is merciful, forgiving all in the name of God, because God forgives everything.

"May there be light in your hearts, in your families, in your cities. And now, with this wish, let us turn on the light.

"Blessed be God Almighty, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Merry Christmas and pray for me".

Spend time in silence and service before Christmas, pope suggests

In the heart of Rome's high-end shopping district, sparkling with Christmas lights and shiny baubles in the windows of famous designers, Pope Francis prayed that people would spend time in silence and in service as they prepare to celebrate Jesus' birth. Celebrating the feast of the Immaculate Conception on Monday, Pope Francis prayed for Mary's intercession so that, "in us, your children, grace also will prevail over pride, and we can become merciful like our heavenly Father is merciful."

Before laying a basket of cream-colored roses at the foot of a statue of the Immaculate Conception near Rome's Spanish Steps, Pope Francis recited a special prayer he composed for the occasion.

The feast is a major Rome holiday, and with brilliant blue skies replacing days of grey and rain, thousands of people lined the streets near the Spanish Steps to catch a glimpse of the pope and pray with him for Mary's assistance.

Pope Francis said Mary being conceived without sin should give all Christians hope and strength "in the daily battle that we must conduct against the threats of evil," because her immaculate conception is proof that evil does not have power over love.

"In this struggle we are not alone, we are not orphans," he said, because Jesus gave his mother to be our mother.

"Today we invoke her maternal protection on us, our families, this city and the world," the pope said, praying that God would "free humanity from every spiritual and material slavery."

"In this time that leads up to the feast of Jesus' birth, teach us how to go against the current," Pope Francis prayed to Mary. Teach people how to be unencumbered, "to give ourselves, to listen, to be silent, to not focus on ourselves, but to leave space for the beauty of God, the source of true joy."

In a small blue Ford Focus, the pope was driven to the Spanish Steps' neighbourhood after first stopping for a private prayer at the Basilica of St. Mary Major.

Earlier in the day, with thousands of people gathered in St. Peter's Square, Pope Francis led the recitation of the Angelus, a Marian prayer.

Commenting on the feast day's Gospel reading -- Luke's story of the annunciation to Mary that she would be Jesus' mother -- the pope said it was important that Mary did not respond, "I will do what you say," but "May it be done unto me."

"The attitude of Mary of Nazareth," he said, "shows us that being comes before doing, and that we must let God do in order to be truly as he wants us to be. He will accomplish marvels in us."

"We, too, are asked to listen to God, who speaks to us and accept his will," the pope said. "According to Gospel logic, nothing is more effective and fruitful than listening and accepting the word of the Lord."

The pope also said the Gospel story shows how Mary "is receptive, but not passive." She agrees to God's will, receives the power of the Holy Spirit and gives "flesh and blood" to the son of God.

And while Mary was conceived without sin -- a special and unique privilege -- "we, too, always have been 'blessed,' that is loved, and therefore 'chosen before the foundation of the world, to be holy and without blemish before him,' " as the day's reading from Ephesians said.

Recognising how blessed they are, the pope said, Christians must be filled with gratitude and ready to share their blessings with others.

"If everything has been given to us, everything must be given again," he said. "How? By letting the Holy Spirit make us a gift for others."

Pope Francis encouraged Christians to let the Holy Spirit make them "instruments of welcoming, instruments of reconciliation, instruments of forgiveness."

Have you had the experience of being in the wilderness, feeling lost? From whom did you hear a voice that gave you hope? Have you been able to give hope to other people when they were in the wilderness?

Our Second Reading today prays 'may God himself, the God of peace, sanctify you through and through'. What does it mean to be 'sanctified', to be 'made holy'? We suffer today from some very skewed ideas about those who are 'holy': the caricature is of people who are otherworldly, excessively serious, and who suffer from bouts of 'holier-than-thou-ism'. Yet nothing could be further from the truth. To be holy is to be 'whole', 'well-rounded', exuberant with life ('rejoice always'). And, most importantly, to have hearts full of gratitude ('give thanks in all circumstances'). In the words of Ronald Rolheiser, 'the holiest person you know is the most grateful person you know'.

The Deep End – 'A Witness to Speak for the Light':

There is so much darkness around us: in the Church, in the troubled parts of the world, in our own families and even in our own hearts. It is easy to become cynical. Saturday 20th December - St. Fachanan (bishop) Although little is known with certainty about Fachanan, a strong tradition from early times links him with Kilfenora and records that he founded a Church or monastery there in the 6th century. He is venerated as the patron of the diocese of Kilfenora, now part of Galway.

Sunday 21st December –

St. Peter Canisius (priest and Doctor of the Church) [1521-1597] Born in Holland. He intended to become a lawyer but joined the Jesuits. Through courtesy and learning he promoted the Catholic revival after the Council of Trent. His greatest work was a catechism of 211 questions and answers, published in 1555. [Not celebrated this year]
