


POPE SAYS MEMORISE THE BEATITUDES, ASSESS YOUR CARE FOR THE NEEDY

Christians should memorise not only the Ten Commandments but also the beatitudes, which Jesus taught as the path to true happiness. Pope Francis said.

At his weekly general audience Wednesday, the pope said he was so serious about the need for Christians to know the text of the beatitudes from Matthew 5:3-12 -- "Blessed are the poor in spirit ..." -- that he would read each one out loud and have the crowd repeat it.

More than 6,000 people filled the Vatican audience hall and its atrium for the pope's first general audience after a month long break.

One repetition of the text of the beatitudes is not enough to "remember them and impress them on our hearts," the pope said, so he gave the crowd "homework," asking them to spend time in the coming days reading the text again, from the Bible "you always should have with you."

The beatitudes are not only "the path God indicates as his response to the desire for happiness present in each person and the perfection of the (Ten) Commandments," he said; they also are "a portrait of Jesus and his way of life."

In addition to showing people the path to true happiness, the pope said, Jesus gave "us the protocol according to which we will be judged."

"At the end of the world, we will be judged," he said. "And what will the questions be that the judge will ask?" They are listed in Matthew 25: 35-36: Did you feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, care for the sick and visit the prisoner?

"Today, your task is to read the fifth chapter of Matthew where the beatitudes are, and also to read the 25th chapter where the questions are that we will be asked on judgment day," he said.

No one, he said, is so important or has done so many other virtuous things that he or she can escape being asked the questions in Matthew 25. "The Lord will recognise us if we have recognised his face in the face of the hungry, the poor, the marginalised, the sick and the lonely. These are fundamental criteria for verifying our Christian life."

"I read the beatitudes and think about how my life as a Christian should be," the pope said, "and then, I make an examination of conscience with this 25th chapter from Matthew. Every day I ask, 'Did I do this? Did I do that? That?' "It is a simple thing to do, he said, and helps people look at the concrete actions in their lives.

Living according to the beatitudes and the criteria listed in Matthew 25, he said, should fill each Christian with joy because together "they make our Christian life a beautiful and credible witness to the love of God for all the brothers and sisters we meet each day."

Guidelines on Use of Modern Technology when Working with Children: - Use of photography and video
The use of photography and video is an issue of great concern among those working with children. The Diocese
recognises that every parish has their own arrangements in relation to its use in schools, youth groups and for the
sacraments however the guidelines have been devised below to aid parishes and diocesan groups:

- It is always good practice to seek *written* permission from a parent or guardian before taking any photographs or video footage of children. This written permission must be sought from the parent/guardian or the person who owns the photograph before it can be displayed on promotional materials or websites. This can be incorporated in the registration form when a child joins a group (template permission Resource 10):
- Neither names nor any personal information should be displayed alongside any photographs;
- Special consideration should be given where taking photographs or video footage might be misinterpreted, or the
 images could be seen as provocative (e.g. beach trip or gymnastics display etc.). It is not to say, however, that
 with the right planning, these events cannot be recorded and enjoyed.
- Photography and video recording are important methods of recording social activity and providing an historic
 record illustrating and validating important moments in people's lives. This process is a powerful and personal
 one, and therefore we must respect the rights of all to make the choice whether or not to be photographed.

Musings

Today's First Reading has God's 'still small voice' tip-toe up to Elijah ears without fanfare.

The famous American Trappist monk and spiritual writer, Thomas Merton (1915-68) once wrote that 'the inspirations of the Holy Spirit are quiet, for God speaks in the silent depths of the spirit. It does not arouse excitement, but allays it, because excitement belongs to uncertainty.' In another place he cautioned 'If we strive to be happy by filling all the silences of life with sound, productive by turning all life's leisure into work, and real by turning all our being into doing, we will only succeed in producing a hell on earth.'

The Deep End – It's a Test:

If it is a test, the Canaanite woman passes with flying colours! Her faith is impressive. When Jesus ignores her initial appeal, she tries again. And when he knocks her back, she replies with a witty retort: 'Ah yes, sir; but even house-dogs can eat the scraps that fall from their master's table.'

I always find this exchange amusing. At first reading, it seems that the woman has got one up on Jesus. He attempted to fob her off, and her quick wit has caught him out. We can imagine him chuckling as he concedes 'Woman, you have great faith'.

But the exchange also makes me wonder: what was Jesus really up to? By the end of the conversation, he is clearly impressed with the woman's faith, her wit and her wisdom. But why the test? Why does he try to fob her off, and why the dog reference?

In the Gospels, Jesus often tests his followers. He certainly tests Peter and the other disciples. He challenges them to think, and to come up with the right answers. Perhaps he is testing not only the woman's faith but also his disciples'. In using the analogy of a 'house-dog', he may well be giving voice to the thoughts of his disciples. They would have little time for this Canaanite woman, a Gentile. They certainly would not have expected her to demonstrate such faith.

Perhaps it was an exchange that would come back to them at a later date as they expanded their mission to the Gentiles. Paul would later talk of God's mercy 'to all mankind' (see today's Second Reading). A far cry from 'house-dogs'!

Musings

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This Week's Calendar of Feasts and Saints:

- Tuesday 19th August St. John Eudes (priest) [1601-1680] From Normandy France, he spent a fruitful twenty years with the French Oratory then left to improve the standards of the clergy through seminaries. He also founded the Sisters of Our Lady of Charity and Refuge. He was a powerful preacher and among the first to promote devotion to the Sacred Heart.
- Wednesday 20th August St. Bernard (abbot and doctor of the Church) [1090-1153] Became a Cistercian monk at Citeaux in 1113 and was chosen abbot of Clairvaux in 1115. His writings reveal a strong grasp of biblical studies, spiritual theology and philosophy. He is patron of Gibraltar and bee-keepers.
- Thursday 21st August St. Pius X (pope) Cardinal Patriarch of Venice and then Pope from 1903, he encouraged pastoral liturgy and sacramental practice, especially of frequent communion, to which he admitted young children.
- Friday 22nd August The Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary During the Middle Ages Mary was venerated as queen of the angels and saints. Pope Pius XII prescribed it for the universal Church at the close of the Marian year, 1955. It is placed on this date to stress the connection of queenship with the Assumption.
- Saturday 23rd August St. Eugene St. Eugene lived in the 6th century and was said to have been taken By pirates to Britain. On obtaining his freedom he went to study at Candida Casa. Returning to Ireland he made a foundation at Kilnamanagh in the Wicklow hills, but his principal foundation was at Ardstraw (Ard Sratha), Co. Tyrone. He is patron of the diocese of Derry.
 - St. Rose of Lima [1586-1617] Dominican tertiary and recluse, helped the poor and marginalised. Seen as originator of social service in Peru. South America.
- Sunday 24th August St. Bartholomew (Apostle) Bartholomew's name occurs in the Synoptic Gospels only in the list of apostles. He is probably to be identified with the Nathaniel of Cana, whom Philip brings to our Lord. Preached the Gospel in India. Patron saint of plasterers, tanners and leather workers. [Not celebrated this year]

Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels – *Matthew 15:21-28*:

- Having met with rejection from the Pharisees, Jesus goes to Gentile territory and encounters faith in an
 unexpected place, in the Canaanite woman. His mission had previously been to his own people. This adds a
 new dimension to his mission. Have you had occasions when a chance encounter set your life off in a new
 direction?
- The Canaanite woman was not concerned for herself but for her daughter. Recall people you have known who have been committed to a noble cause.
- 3. The initial reaction of Jesus to the woman was one of rejection but her persistence won a response from him. When have you found that persistence was needed to gain what you sought? What did that experience teach you?
- 4. Who are the 'Canaanite women' who call out for attention today people in Church or State whose needs are not being attended to?
