- A. Silent worship is wonderful in its own place but the celebration of the Eucharist is a community prayer which recognises the presence of the Lord not only in the consecrated host but also in the gathered community, in the word and in the mission to go out in love and service. 'Though there are many of us we form a single body, because we all have a share in the one loaf (1 Cor. 10:17). Sharing responses, gestures and movements with others is recognition of Christ in the body that is the community.

**Questions on this Sunday's Scripture:** These questions based on each of today's scripture readings can be used for family, group or individual reflection.

# First Reading - The Book of the prophet Jeremiah, Chapter 23, Verses 1-6:

- 1. In this reading Jeremiah reflects on a bad leadership situation. What are the priorities or values of a shepherd whose sheep tremble and fear? What are the priorities and values of a good shepherd?
- 2. You are a shepherd. What can you do about the fear people experience all over the world due to injustice? Can you do anything to remedy any of the injustice? Is there anything you can do about unfair situations in your own town?

### Second Reading - Second Letter to the Ephesians, Chapter 2, Verses 13-18:

- Paul was a Jew preaching to Gentiles and also a Christian preaching to Jews. There were a lot of barriers or dividing walls as Paul calls them. Discuss dividing walls present today among peoples of different beliefs, races or cultures.
- 2. What are the dividing walls in the Church today? Which ones seem most impenetrable to you?

# Gospel - According to Mark, Chapter 6, Verses 30-34:

- 1. What does Jesus do in this gospel story that is an example of good shepherding?
- 2. Discuss compassion and power as attributes of leadership.

#### This Week's Calendar of Saints:

**Monday 20**th – St. Apollinarius preached the Gospel in the region of Ravenna in the second century. He was bishop of Classis where he suffered martyrdom.

**Tuesday 21st** – St. Lawrence of Brindisi, priest and doctor of the Church. Lawrence (1559-1619) was a Capuchin who preached the Counter-Reformation.

**Wednesday 22**<sup>nd</sup> – St. Mary Magdalene. Mary stood by the cross with Jesus; along with two other women she discovered the empty tomb; she was granted an appearance of the Risen Lord early on the same day, from which incident she has been described as apostle to the apostles. The Gospels give no warrant for identifying her with the woman who was a sinner who anointed Christ's feet (Luke 7:37) or with Mary the sister of Martha (John 12:3).

**Thursday 23**<sup>rd</sup> – St. Bridget of Sweden, Religious, Patron of Europe. Born in Sweden in 1303, Bridget brought up eight children and after the death of her husband dedicated herself to an aesthetical life. She later founded the Bridgettine Order and lived in Rome. She wrote many works about her mystical appearances. She was declared a Patron of Europe in 2000.

**Friday 24**th – St. Declan, bishop. Declan is considered to be one of the pre-Patrician saints. Colman, a local priest, baptised him. After travelling to Europe where he was ordained priest, and possibly bishop, he settled in Ardmore and evangelised the Decies country.

St. Charbel Makhluf, priest. Charbel became a monk at the monastery of St. Maron at Annaya and was ordained in 1859. He became a hermit from 1875 until his death in 1898. His counsel was much sought after and he had a great devotion to the Blessed Sacrament.

Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> – St. James, Apostle. James, son of Zebedee and brother of John, was put to death by Herod Agrippa about the year 44, being the first of the Apostles to die for Christ. His shrine is at Compostela in Spain. Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> – Sts. Joachim and Anne, parents of Mary. Traditionally named parents of Mary and grandparents of the Lord. St. Anne is patron of Canada, women in labour, miners, cabinet-makers and home-makers – this feast is not celebrated this year.

### Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels – Mark 6: 30-34:

- 1. The apostles reported to Jesus all that they had done and taught. Perhaps you have had the experience of being able to check in with somebody and share an experience. What was that like for you?
- 2. Jesus saw that the apostles needed to rest and eat. What has been your experience of finding a restful place after a busy day? What kind of nourishment have you found necessary in order to live with energy and enthusiasm? What have these insights taught you about life?
- 3. When Jesus saw the crowd, he recognised their need and reached out to them. Who has been a Jesus person for you, someone who recognised your need and reached out to you? For whom have you been a Jesus person in that way?
- 4. It sometimes can be difficult to strike a balance between responding to the needs of others and meeting our need for rest and nourishment. What has helped you to keep the balance right?

#### The Deep End – Silence:

In *The World of Silence*, Max Picard writes, 'And yet sometimes all the noise of the world today seems like the mere buzzing of insects on the broad back of silence.' There's something substantial about silence. Often people describe it as 'heavy'. Silence is formidable, even intimidating, if you're not friendly with it. But to be friendly with it, first you have to be friendly with you. One way of finding out if you are, is to go off to a lonely spot and see how long you can stay there before unease sets in.

How many people follow Jesus' advice to his disciples in today's Gospel (Mark 6:30-34) to go to a deserted place for peace and quiet? Are they not more inclined to go to a noisy holiday resort where's there's lots of action, lots of people, lots of things to do to fill the gap, lots of ways to forget oneself? Is there not something desperate about having to have a good time, and worse yet to feel obliged to say you had, even though you may not have had? Getting used to silent, solitary periods to relax, to refresh our spirit and take stock of our life is worthwhile. It helps us to think about important things that in the normal course of a day we rarely think of. Things like: life and its purpose, values we live by, people we hold precious, ambitions that drive us, the place we give to God in our life. Silence is necessary not for finding answers but for finding questions.
