We commend the many adults and young people who have chosen to remain abstinent from alcohol until 18 years old or for life.

We encourage people who feel that for them alcohol has become a problem and decide to seek professional help from treatment centres, local health services or support groups in their community.

We commend all the good work which is done by support groups around the country and the many parishes and communities that provide meeting rooms and services for such groups.

What a great legacy and gift it would be for our children if we would be the generation brave enough to promote and work for an attitude and culture of moderation rather than excess in our use of alcohol. If we could promote abstinence or moderation and create attitudes towards alcohol use that are conducive to a better and healthier way of life, then indeed we would be leaving a wonderful inheritance to future generations.

The Second Reading today speaks of Christ as our peace, destroying the dividing walls of hostility between people through his death on the cross. It is ironic, of course, that the very city in which Christ was crucified has become synonymous with walls of hostility between peoples - as have cities such as Berlin and Belfast in the past. But in our daily lives most of these walls are not made of bricks, or indeed steel. They are more usually made up of unkind words squirreled away and retained for future airing; old grievances nursed and fed; slights unforgiven and allowed to fester. Where is Christ in these for us today?

The Deep End - Nourishment.

Although today's Gospel is short, there is plenty of food for thought. The apostles have returned to Jesus after their mission. They are exhausted and we are told have not even had time to 'eat'. They are in need of rest and nourishment in body, mind and spirit. Jesus gives good instruction to them and to us today: 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while'. Our world demands so much from us, everyone is so busy all of the time. Jesus's instruction tells us that time out is so important; we need to look after ourselves.

Of course it doesn't go to plan. The crowd are desperate for guidance. Jesus takes pity on them as they are like 'sheep without a shepherd'. Either they have no one to guide them or the leaders who are guiding them are offering a fruitless leadership. These people need to be listened to. What are they asking for? What do they need? As Church, are we offering people what they need or are we leading them to the 'safe places' that no longer serve their needs? Where are people going for nourishment today? These are important questions. We must listen to the need in ourselves for rest and nourishment and also respond to the real needs of others.

This Wester Colondar of Feasts and Coints

This Week's Calendar of Feasts and Saints:		
Tuesday 21st July – St. Lawrence of Brindisi (priest and doctor of the Church) [1559-1619] A Capuchin who preached the Counter-Reformation.		
Wednesday 22 nd July – <i>St. Mary Magdalene</i> Mary stood by the cross with Jesus; with two other women she discovered the empty tomb; she was granted an appearance of the Risen Lord early On the same day, from which incident she has been described as apostle to the apostles. The Gospels give no warrant for identifying her with the woman who was a sinner who anointed Christ's feet (Luke 7:37) or with Mary the sister of Martha (John 12:3).		
Thursday 23rd July – St. Bridget of Sweden (religious and Patron of Europe) Born in Sweden in 1303, Bridget brought up 8 children and after the death of her husband dedicated herself to An aesthetical life. She later founded the Bridgettine Order and lived in Rome. She wrote many works about her mystical appearances. She was declared a Patron of Europe in 2000.		
Friday 24 th July – St. Charbel Makhluf (priest) Became a monk at the monastery of St. Maron at Annaya and was ordained in 1859. He became a hermit from 1875 until his death in 1898. His counsel was much sought after and he had a great devotion to the Blessed Sacrament.		
St. Declan (bishop) Considered to be one of the pre-Patrician saints. Colman, a local priest, baptised him. After travelling to Europe where he was ordained priest, and possibly bishop, he settled in Ardmore and evangelised the Decies country.		
Saturday 25 th July – <i>St. James (apostle)</i> James, son of Zebedee and brother of John, was put to death by Herod Agrippa about the year 44, being the first of the Apostles to die for Christ. His shrine is at Compostela in Spain.		
Sunday 26 th July – St. Joachim and St. Anne (parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary) Both received the vision of an angel, who announced that Anne would conceive and bear a most wondrous child. The couple rejoiced at the birth of their daughter, whom Anne named Mary. When the child was three years old, Joachim and Anne, in fulfilment of her divine promise, brought Mary to the Temple at Jerusalem, where they left her to be brought up. This event became so important in church doctrine that by 1585 Pope Sixtus V included in the Western church calendar the liturgical feast of the Presentation of the Virgin Mary (21 st November). Although this festival originated early in the East, probably at Jerusalem in 543, its first Western observance was recorded in England in the 11 th century. Anne is the Patron of Brittany and Canada and of women in labour. [NOT CELEBRATED THIS YEAR]
