Posture during Mass: Bishop Hegarty commends the following common posture, as set down in the *General Instruction* (43) for observation throughout the diocese:

- 1. Standing from the beginning until the end of the Collect;
- 2. Standing from the Orate Fratres (pray brothers and sisters...) until the end of the Sanctus;
- 3. Standing from Concluding Prayer until the end of Mass.
- 4. The practice of kneeling during the Eucharistic Prayer and Communion is laudably retained.

This Week's Calendar of Feasts: Monday 21st November – Feast of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Marv Tuesday 22nd November - St. Cecilia (virgin and martyr) The patroness of music and musicians, was a 2nd or 3rd century Roman Christian martyr. According to tradition, she refused to worship the Roman gods and was beheaded. Her association with music and the representations of her playing the organ probably grew from a misunderstanding of a 5th century account of her life. Wednesday 23rd November - St. Columban (abbot and missionary) [543-615] Also known as Columbanus. Became a monk of Bangor and later principal teacher there. In 591, desiring to 'go on a pilgrimage for Christ' he set out with 12 companions and came to Burgundy. He established monasteries at Annegray, Luxeuil and Fontaine according to the severe Irish rule. Later he founded Bregenz in Austria and his greatest foundation at Bobbio, near Genoa, where he died. Remembered as one of the greatest of the Irish Missionary monks. **Thursday 24th November** – St. Andrew Dung-Lac (priest) and Companions (martyrs) In the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries in Vietnam many Christians suffered martyrdom. On 19th June, 1988 Pope John Paul II canonised 117 of these. 96 native Vietnamese men and women. 11 Dominican missionaries from Spain and 10 French missionaries. Sunday 27th November – St. Fergal (Virgil) (bishop and missionary) Lived first in France and then in Bavaria, where he founded the monastery of Chiemsee. He was appointed bishop of Salzburg around 754 and died in 784, leaving a reputation for learning and holiness. Not celebrated this year

Questions people ask:

- Q. What is the temporal punishment due to sin? Does it mean that God forgives us but imposes some sort of punishment at the same time?
- A. I don't think you've got it right. This punishment is called temporal as opposed to the eternal punishment which is the hell of unrepented evil. God does not impose the punishment but it is something self-inflicted. Any time I behave in a sinful manner I am damaging my character. If I lash out at somebody in anger I have damaged my spiritual health. The good news is that healing is available for this damaged character if we co-operate with the graces of the sacraments of Penance and Eucharist.

Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels – Matthew 25:31-46:

- 1. This judgement scene contains surprises for us. One is that nobody is condemned for doing wrong, but for their failure to do good. Jesus is telling us that being his disciple is a positive choice about how we live and relate to others. What difference has it made for you when you viewed your Christian life as a daily opportunity to make a positive difference to others?
- 2. Another way of saving this is that the aim of Christian living is not me-centred (about my personal sanctification) but other-centred (about responding to the needs of others). What happens to you when you get caught up in yourself? Is your life not better, and often more enjoyable, when you can look beyond yourself to others?
- 3. Another surprise is to hear Jesus tell us that when we do something for another, he considers it as done to himself. When has seeing Christ in others helped you in your dealings with them?
- 4 The story is about the judgement of the whole of humanity. It presents an ideal of society in which human relationships at all levels are governed by the law of love. In your experience what difference has it made to a group to which you belonged when there was a definite sensitivity to the needs of all members? John Byrne OSA (john@orlagh.ie)

Have you ever seen the TV programme Secret Millionaire? In each episode a millionaire leaves his or her luxury life behind, takes on a secret identity, and lives undercover in a deprived area to find out who needs their help. They work alongside local people, discovering individuals and projects they think deserve a share of their fortune, before coming clean and surprising them with monetary gifts to help them in their work.

Often those who most impress the benefactor are those who are quietly working for the benefit of others, who give generously of their time and talents to make a better life for those in their local community. They are the ones who, in spite of their busy lives, are also the most welcoming and helpful to the undercover millionaire.

They are not in it for the money. They are not generous to the visitor among them because he is rich or because they expect to get something out of them. They are the people who see a need and do something to tackle it, and their simple acts of generosity lead to great rewards.

Jesus expects us to treat everyone we encounter with sensitivity and generosity. Today's Gospel reminds us of our responsibility to care for our fellow man; to feed the hungry, make strangers welcome, provide for those who are without, visit those who are sick or imprisoned. There are simple acts of mercy we can carry out each day.
