

Prayer from the Community at Taize: God of love, we are disconcerted by the violence in Syria and elsewhere in the world. So we turn to you - you do not let us give in to discouragement. You bring us to understand that our prayer and our compassion count. Be close to those who are suffering and send your Holy Spirit, that all humans may be inspired to make signs of peace.

The Advent Candles: Candles are lit to symbolise the light of God coming into the world through the birth of Christ. On the first, second and fourth Sundays of Advent a purple candle is lit (each Sunday the candle from the previous Sunday is re-lit) the colour purple as used during the period of Lent, reminds us to prepare a welcome for Jesus during the Advent season. On the third Sunday of Advent a pink candle is lit. Pink is the colour of joy to remind us that we should be ready to welcome Christ at Christmas. On Christmas Eve the while candle is lit to celebrate the Birth of Christ - the Light of the World.

Advent has a twofold character: as a season to prepare for Christmas when Christ's first coming to us is remembered; as a season when that remembrance directs the mind and heart to await Christ's Second Coming at the end of time. Advent is thus a period for devout and joyful expectation. There are two stages in Advent: the first runs until 16th December, the second which, is mainly directed to the Christmas feasts runs from 17th December until 24th December.

The Advent Wreath: Placing four candles on green fronds has become a symbol of Advent in many Christian homes especially in Germanic countries and in North America - we do so in Church each year. The Advent wreath with its progressive lighting of four candles, each Sunday until Christmas is a recollection of the various stages of salvation history prior to Christ's coming and a symbol of the prophetic light gradually illuminating the long night prior to the rising of the Sun of Justice (cf Mal 3:20; Luke 1:18).

Guidelines on Use of Modern Technology when Working with Children: - Use of photography and video
The use of photography and video is an issue of great concern among those working with children. The Diocese
recognises that every parish has their own arrangements in relation to its use in schools, youth groups and for the
sacraments however the guidelines have been devised below to aid parishes and diocesan groups:

- It is always good practice to seek written permission from a parent or guardian before taking any photographs
  or video footage of children. This written permission must be sought from the parent/guardian or the person
  who owns the photograph before it can be displayed on promotional materials or websites. This can be
  incorporated in the registration form when a child joins a group (template permission Resource 10);
- Neither names nor any personal information should be displayed alongside any photographs;
- Special consideration should be given where taking photographs or video footage might be misinterpreted, or
  the images could be seen as provocative (e.g. beach trip or gymnastics display etc.). It is not to say, however,
  that with the right planning, these events cannot be recorded and enjoyed.
- Photography and video recording are important methods of recording social activity and providing an historic
  record illustrating and validating important moments in people's lives. This process is a powerful and
  personal one, and therefore we must respect the rights of everyone to make the choice whether or not to be
  photographed.

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# The Deep End - Rejoice:

Las Posadas, from the Spanish word meaning 'shelter' or 'lodging', is an Advent tradition in parts of Central America. It starts tomorrow, December 16, and takes place over nine days until Christmas Eve. During the days, which symbolise the nine months of Mary's pregnancy, Mary and Joseph's search for a place to stay in Bethlehem is re-enacted. Participants process from house to house, being turned away by 'innkeepers' before finally being welcomed in for a celebration and feast.

A special song is sung outside each house, the final verse of which includes the (translated) lyrics:

Enter holy pilgrims...
Tonight is for joy,
for pleasure and rejoicing
for tonight we will give lodging
to the Mother of God the Son.'

The custom really captures the drama and the joy of the Christmas story.

Today is known as Gaudete Sunday or 'Rejoice Sunday'. In our churches, the rose coloured candle is lit on the Advent wreath to symbolise joy. Today's readings bring out this sense of joyful anticipation of the Lord's coming. The people of Jesus' time would have been familiar with Isaiah's talk of 'everlasting joy'. And Jesus tells us: 'Happy is the man who does not lose faith in me'. We have reason to be happy. Let us make this Gaudete Sunday a real celebration.

The Gospel today brings to mind that familiar saying attributed to St Francis of Assisi: 'Go out and preach a sermon and, only if necessary, use words'. When John asks if Christ is really the one who is to come, he does not receive a direct answer. Rather, his attention is drawn to the fruits that are witnessed to by those who have encountered Christ. It may not be a bad question to also ask ourselves: what effect does our being Christian have on our family, friends, community, etc. Does Christ continue to live in our community through us?

Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> December – St. John of Kanty (priest) [1390-1473] Taught Theology and Scripture in the university of Cracow, Poland. He is also remembered for his austerity of life and generosity.

Wednesday 25th December – The Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ THE PROCLAMATION OF CHRISTMAS

Today the twenty-fifth day of December, unknown ages from the time when God created the heavens and the earth and then formed man and woman in his own image.

Several thousand years after the flood.

when God made the rainbow shine forth as a sign of the covenant.

Twenty-one centuries from the time of Abraham and Sarah;
thirteen centuries after Moses led the people of Israel out of Egypt.

Eleven hundred years from the time of Ruth and the judges;
one thousand years from the anointing of David as king;
in the sixty-fifth week according to the prophecy of Daniel;
In the one hundred and ninety-fourth Olympiad;

the seven hundred and fifty-second year from the foundation of the city of Rome.

The forty-second year of the reign of Octavian Augustus; the whole world being at peace,

Jesus Christ, eternal God and Son of the eternal Father, desiring to sanctify the world by his most merciful coming, being conceived by the Holy Spirit, and nine months having passed since his conception, was born in Bethlehem of Judea of the Virgin Mary.

Today is the nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the flesh.

Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> December – St. Stephen (first martyr) The first Christian martyr, was one of the disciples
Who was in charge of the poor and needy. He is outstanding for forgiveness of
his enemies. Patron Saint of deacons, stonemasons and bricklayers.

Friday 27th December – St. John (Apostle and Evangelist) John was the brother of James, son of Zebedee.

The disciple whom Jesus loved, is traditionally said to have died in Ephesus. He is considered to be the author of the fourth Gospel, the book of Revelation and three letters. The letters especially teach us the law of love: John is said in his old age to

have preached only one message: 'love one another'.

Saturday 28th December – *The Feast of the Innocents (martyrs)* The flight into Egypt and the massacre of the Holy Innocents make manifest the opposition of darkness to the light: He came to his own home, and his own people received him not." Christ's whole life was lived under the sign of persecution. His own share it with him. Jesus' departure from Egypt recalls the exodus and presents him as the definitive liberator of God's people.
