Welcome (fáilte go Caisléan Glass) – In last week's clerical changes Fr. Edward Gallagher was appointed by Bishop McKeown to the parish of Greencastle as our new parish priest. We offer him a warm welcome this weekend and we pray that his ministry among us will be richly blessed

Fr. Edward Gallagher was born in Brooklyn, New York. Eldest of the 6 children of Evelina and the late William Gallagher. At the age of 10 he moved to Derry. He has one brother and four sisters. After attending St. Columba's College, Derry he then proceeded to begin studies for the priesthood at St. Patrick's College, Maynooth being ordained to the priesthood on Sunday 12th June, 1994 in St. Brigid's Church, Carnhill, Derry. Since then he has served as curate in Holy Family Parish Derry, Cappagh and Limavady. He also spent 5 years on the Derry Diocesan Mission to Belize, Central America. Latterly he has served as Administrator at St. Columba's Church, Long Tower in Derry. Fr. Gallagher will be inducted as the 13th parish priest of Greencastle in St. Patrick's Church by Bishop McKeown on Thursday 17th September at 7.30pm.

St Eugene (bishop and Patron Saint of Derry Diocese) [Sunday 23rd August]: St Eugene lived in the 6th century and was said to have been taken by pirates to Britain. On obtaining his freedom he went to study at Candida Casa. Returning to Ireland he made a foundation at Kilnamanagh in the Wicklow hills, but his principal foundation was at Ardstraw (Ard Sratha), Co Tyrone.

Pope Francis' Intentions for August (please remember these in your personal prayer)
Universal – Volunteers: That volunteers may give themselves generously to the service of the needy.
Evangelisation – Outreach to the Marginalised: That setting aside our very selves, we may learn to be neighbours to those who find themselves on the margins of human life and society.

Child Safeguarding: If you or anyone you know has a concern or wishes to report an allegation directly to the statutory authorities, please contact the PSNI/or local Health and Social Care Trust. If you are contacting the latter, ask to speak to the Duty Social Worker. Alternatively if you have a child safeguarding concern in relation to any member of Church personnel and wish to report it to Church authorities, please contact one of the diocesan designated persons, who will in turn report your concern to the relevant statutory authorities. *See poster at entrances*

Guidelines on Use of Modern Technology when Working with Children – Use of Photography and Video:
The use of photography and video is an issue of great concern among those working with children. The Diocese recognises that every parish has their own arrangements in relation to its use in schools, youth groups and for the sacraments however the guidelines have been devised below to aid parishes and diocesan groups:

- It is always good practice to seek *written* permission from a parent or guardian before taking any photographs or video footage of children. This written permission must be sought from the parent/guardian or the person who owns the photograph before it can be displayed on promotional materials or websites. This can be incorporated in the registration form when a child joins a group (template permission Resource 10);
- Neither names nor any personal information should be displayed alongside any photographs;
- Special consideration should be given where taking photographs or video footage might be misinterpreted, or the images could be seen as provocative (e.g. beach trip or gymnastics display etc.). It is not to say, however, that with the right planning, these events cannot be recorded and enjoyed.

Photography and video recording are important methods of recording social activity and providing an historic record – illustrating and validating important moments in people's lives. This process is a powerful and personal one, and therefore we must respect the rights of all to make the choice whether or not to be photographed.

This Week's Calendar of Feasts and Saints:

Monday 24th August – St. Bartholomew (apostle) His name, a patronymic, means "son of Tolomai" and scholars believe he is the same as Nathanael mentioned in John, who says he is from Cana and that Jesus called him an "Israelite...incapable of deceit." The Roman Martyrology says he preached in India and Greater Armenia, where he was flayed and beheaded by King Astyages. Tradition has the place as Abanopolis on the west coast of the Caspian Sea and that he also preached in Mesopotamia, Persia, and Egypt. The Gospel of Bartholomew is apochryphal and was condemned in the decree of Pseudo-Gelasius.

Thursday 27th August – St. Monica [332-387] Converted her pagan husband Patricius to the faith, and by her prayers and tears brought her son, St. Augustine to Christianity and a moral life. Patron saint of mothers.

Friday 28th August – St. Augustine (bishop and doctor of the Church) [354-430] Bishop of Hippo where he lived with a community until his death. His theological influence has been most significant in the Church, especially on understanding God's grace. Patron saint of theologians.

Saturday 29th August – The Passion of John the Baptist (martyr) The preface in today's Mass lists the favours shown to St. John the Baptist and the vocation given him. He is found worthy of a martyr's death, and his last and greatest act of witness to Christ.

Sunday 30th August – St. Fiacre An Irishman who went abroad to seek a hermitage. He passed through Normandy and eventually met Faro, who was a great patron of Irish pilgrims at Meaux. Fiachre was given a hermitage near Breuil and stayed there until his death around 670. [NOT CELEBRATED THIS YEAR]

Seeing your life through the lens of the gospel – John 6:60-69: *John Byrne OSA (john@orlagh.ie)*

1. In this chapter Jesus teaches that the meaning of his life, and the meaning of all human life, lies in being prepared to give of oneself. Perhaps you can identify with what Pope Francis says: 'Those who enjoy life most are those who leave security on the shore and become excited by the mission of communicating life to others...'
Pope Francis (Evangelii Gaudium, No.10)
2. 'This teaching is difficult', complained his hearers, including some of his own followers. Perhaps at times you also have wondered if you could go along with it. What helped you to overcome your resistance?
3. 'Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the message of eternal life.' In the midst of your doubts perhaps you have held on to belief because, like Peter, Jesus offered you a more hopeful message than you could find anywhere else. How has the gospel message been more attractive to you than any other?
4. 'The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life.' Recall the words and phrases of Jesus that are word of life for you.

Musings

Salvador Ryan (St. Patrick's College, Maynooth)

Ronald Rolheiser has the following to say about what constitutes a good marriage: 'A good marriage is a big table, loaded with lots of food and drink. When two people love each other sacramentally that love becomes a place of hospitality, a table where people come to be fed – figuratively and really. Again, love, in a true marriage, feeds not just the two people who are generating it, but, because it is sacramental, always contains more than enough surplus to feed everyone who is fortunate enough to meet it.'

The Deep End – Bodies:

Paul Clogher (Waterford Institute of Technology)

John's lengthy episode in the synagogue at Capernaum operates like a press conference that does not end well. Many of Jesus' followers abandon him, scandalised at his Eucharistic tones. 'This is intolerable language,' they muse. Alone with his disciples, Jesus asks them if they wish to leave too. Like the synoptic accounts, Peter takes the opportunity to profess his faith. Here, however, he does not get rewarded with the keys to the kingdom. There are a few twists and turns to go in his story.

The remnant of Jesus' followers have serious questions: what could the miracle of loaves mean? And how could one possibly eat this man's flesh? Perhaps it is only in the Eucharistic body of the community that these scenes make sense.

Theologian Graham Ward calls this expansion the 'displaced body of Jesus Christ' and Gerard Loughlin explains it in this way: 'Jesus' body is gradually lost to sight with its crucifixion, resurrection and ascension. But leaves only in order to return, infinitely transposed in the Eucharistic body that feeds the body of the Church, which becomes Christ's body, not metaphorically, but actually, as its non-identical, analogical repetition.' In the body of believers, this 'intolerable' body of Christ expands and lives most fully in the bodies of others as they share his table.
