Advent Tuesday's Reflections: "Prepare for God's Arrival" (Isaiah 40:3), beginning 25th November directly after 10.00am Mass for 30 minutes – Omagh Prayer Guidance Team will lead. Please feel welcome to participate – an extra special preparation for the feast of Christmas.

SEEING YOUR LIFE THROUGH THE LENS OF THE GOSPELS (*Matthew 25:31-46*): This judgement scene contains surprises for us. One is that nobody is condemned for doing wrong, but for their failure to do good. Jesus is telling us that being his disciple is a positive choice about how we live and relate to others. Perhaps sin-avoidance has sometimes dominated your view of what was being asked of you. What difference has it made for you when you viewed your Christian life as a daily opportunity to make a positive difference to others? Another way of saying this is that the aim of Christian living is not me-centred (about my personal sanctification) but other-centred (about responding to the needs of others). What happens to you when you get caught up yourself? Is your life not better, and often more enjoyable, when you can look beyond yourself to others? The standard of love and concern that Jesus presents challenges us to look beyond our comfort zone to those who are most in need. Who are those most in need in your world? When have you been able to move beyond your comfort zone in reaching out to them? Another surprise is to hear Jesus tell us that when we do something for another, he considers it as done to himself. When has seeing Christ in others helped you in your dealings with them? The story is about the judgement of the whole of humanity. It presents an ideal of society in which human relationships at all levels are governed by the law of love. In your experience what difference has it made to a group to which you belonged when there was a definite sensitivity to the needs of all members?

The Deep End – That New Year's Resolution:

The end is nigh – liturgically that is – as we celebrate: Our Lord Jesus Christ, Universal King. Nothing like going out on a triumphal note! However, lest we fly off in a flurry of fervour, let us listen to what that Universal King says to us today. In the Gospel (Matt 25:31-46) he tells us that some of us are blessed and some are accursed. The blessed are those of us who care for the least among us, those who give food to the hungry and drink to the thirsty; those who welcome the stranger and clothe the naked; those who care for the sick and visit prisoners. The accursed are those of us who do none of this. Now that is not what you'd expect to hear a universal king say. In fact you wouldn't expect him even to be aware of the lowly and the least. But therein lies the greatness of his kingdom: his concern for the weakest. When we pray *The Lord's Prayer* we say, 'may your kingdom come'. We want God's kingdom to establish itself universally as soon as possible. I wonder do we realize that we have a say in that happening. Though the time for its glorious coming is set and known by the Father alone, God's determining of that time just may be influenced by the quality of care that we give to the weakest among us. No need to wait for January to make a New Year's resolution to give that care!
