The Feast of St. Brigid, Secondary Patron of Ireland (1st February): This is not celebrated this year because it falls on a Sunday, However if you wish to have your traditional crosses blessed bring them to Mass with you on that Sunday morning. St. Brigid is renowned for her hospitality, almsgiving and care of the sick. She was born c.454. When she was young her father wished to make a very suitable marriage for her but she insisted in consecrating her virginity to God. She received the veil and spiritual formation probably from St. Mel and prayed for a period under his direction in Ardagh. Others followed her example and this led her to found a double monastery in Kildare with the assistance of Bishop Conleth. She died in 524 and her cult is widespread not only throughout Ireland but in several European lands.

Bonhoeffer: "Christian life is learned and lived through the cultivation of specific habits and practices of forgiveness in the service of holiness that enable persons simultaneously to unlearn their habits"

Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels – Luke 1:14-20:

- 'The time is fulfilled' this is a decisive moment in the life of Jesus. His public ministry is about to begin.
 Recall turning points in your own life when something new happened and with hindsight you can say the time was ripe for it to happen. 'the time was fulfilled'.
- 2. 'Repent and believe the good news.' Jesus called for a change of heart, as a response to the good news. A new level of faith in yourself leads to a new way of seeing yourself. A new way of understanding God leads to a conversion in how we relate to God, a change of heart. A growth in awareness of who we are can lead us to a new level of self-confidence, another change of heart. Can you recall times when 'good news' led you to a change of heart?
- 3. The Spirit of God who was at work in Jesus calling the disciples continues to work in our day and in our lives. In the everyday events of our own lives we can see the grace of God at work. When have you had what you would consider a 'call experience' that led you to a different style of life? Who was the 'Jesus person' through whom the call came to you? To whom have you been a 'Jesus person' in this way?

Questions people ask:

- Q. Jesus often spoke about the kingdom of God, especially in his parables. Was he referring to the next life or to life here on earth?
- A. Sometimes the kingdom means the next life, but, more often in the Gospels, the kingdom or reign of God refers to living according to the rule of God here on earth. It means the end of the reign of sin as the ideals of Christ become the rule of life in society. This is what Jesus proclaimed at the start of his public mission. We pray for this in saying 'Thy kingdom come.'

The Deep End – Revolution:

Paul makes more strange statements this week. Take today's Second Reading, 'Let those who have wives be as though they had none, and those who mourn as though they were not mourning' (1 Cor 7:29-31). He's convinced that the age in which he lives is ending. He's right in one sense, and wrong in another. He's wrong if he means the end of the world in terms of chronological time. He's right if he means the end of this world for the Christian in terms of its ways and values. That has a ring to it that needs to be heard every bit as urgently today as it did in Paul's time in Corinth.

In fact, in today's Gospel reading (Mark 1:14-20) we have Jesus preaching just that as his first public proclamation in the Gospel of Mark: 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news.'

Note the sequence here. Repent first; then believe. Clearly, acceptance of the news that Jesus brings as good is not possible without a change of heart and mind. And what is that news? Well, at this stage it's the fact that the kingdom of God is at hand. Later, in the light of Jesus' resurrection it becomes clear that entry into that kingdom brings resurrected life: new, full and everlasting.

When, like Paul, we believe that such a destiny can be ours then we'll look on this present world as passing, and act accordingly. Counter-cultural is what some people call it. Revolutionary is what I'd say it is!
