This Week's Calendar of Feasts and Saints:

Monday 29th August – The Beheading of John the Baptist (Martyr)

Tuesday 30th August – St. Fiacre (Monk) An Irishman who went abroad to seek a hermitage. He passed through Normandy and eventually met Faro who was a great patron of Irish pilgrims at Meaux. Fiachre was given a hermitage near Breuil and there he stayed until his death around 670.

Wednesday 31st August – St. Aidan of Lindisfarne (Bishop and Missionary) Was of Irish descent and a monk of Iona. When Oswald, the exiled king of Northumbria, who had fled for refuge to Iona returned to his throne in 634 he invited Aidan to come and reconvert his people. Aidan made his headquarters at Lindisfarne. With the aid of the king as interpreter he was very successful in his mission. He died in 651.

Saturday 3rd September – St. Gregory the Great (Pope and Dotor of the Church) [540-604] A Roman noble who was Prefect of the City before becoming a monk. As Pope he established a pattern for the papacy in years to come, calling himself servant of the servants of Christ. He sent missions to Lombardy, Sardinia and England. Patron of musicians

Sunday 4th September – St. Mac Nissi (Bishop) Oengus Mac Nissi took his name from his mother Cnes or Ness. It is claimed that Patrick baptised him and taught him the psalms. He chose the district of Connor for his hermitage, but later became bishop of his clan.

Died early in the 6th century.

Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels – Matthew 16: 21-27:

1. Short-term loss is sometimes necessary for long-term gain, as a student studying or an athlete training can testify. When have you found that denying yourself proved to be worthwhile because of what you gained afterwards?
2. Jesus was teaching his followers that the path of discipleship would involve pain and suffering. Peter would have none of it. When have you found that taking up your cross brought you life, even though at the time it may have been difficult?

4. Jesus promised that those who suffer for the kingdom would be rewarded. Perhaps, even in this earthly life, you have experienced reward for faithful discipleship. What have these rewards been?

Details on liturgy.ie It is important to ensure that Mass-goers have prior awareness of the changes that will take place in September.

Missalettes may include a changed lead-in by the priest to a changed congregational response e.g. the invitation to Holy Communion or the Congregational Card, published by Veritas, may be the best option. This card contains all the changes that affect the congregation. If a parish produces its own congregational aid copyright permissions and ecclesiastical authorisation should be respected.

Missalettes vary in style and content and may not provide what is needed on a Sunday Again, the Congregational Card or equivalent will be helpful.

The changes apply to weekday celebrations of Mass from September At these Masses, a congregational card will be vital. It is important to make plans for occasions when there are larger numbers in attendance, for example, at a Funeral Mass. Some of the difficulties in these circumstances will be lessened as those who are regular church goers become familiar with the changes.

New music is provided One mark of the new edition of the Missal is the high profile given to music. A collection of new settings, **Sing the Mass**, was launched at the Irish Church Music Association summer school. Also included will be some familiar Mass settings modified for the changes in the new edition of the Missal. Music is a powerful way of introducing texts with changes and parishes should begin to learn some of the new settings. Sr Perpetua Mc Nulty has prepared a new approved setting and this is being promoted with musicians and singers in the Diocese.

Changes in the Mass texts affect other liturgies The most obvious change is the response 'and with your spirit,' replacing 'and also with you.' This change can be made without raising difficulties. In the Rite of Communion for the Sick, someone who is housebound may well see saying the new version of 'Behold the Lamb of God . . .' and 'Lord, I am not worthy . . .' as expressing their unity with the parish community which is using the new wording.

First Sunday of Advent (27th November) It is our understanding that the new edition of the Missal will be available from late August, published by Veritas in two editions, an altar edition and a smaller 'oratory edition.' Full use of the new edition of the Missal takes place on the First Sunday of Advent.

On Life After World Youth Day

"Help the Church Grow ... in the Hearts of Many"

MADRID, Spain, AUG. 21, 2011 (zenit.org).- Here is a Vatican translation of the address Benedict XVI delivered today before and after reciting the midday Angelus with the youth attending the 2011 World Youth Day, held at Cuatro Vientos Air Base in Madrid.

Dear Friends,

You are now about to go back home. Your friends will want to know how you have changed after being in this lovely city with the Pope and with hundreds of thousands of other young people from around the world. What are you going to tell them? I invite you to give a bold witness of Christian living to them. In this way you will give birth to new Christians and will help the Church grow strongly in the hearts of many others.

During these days, how often I have thought of the young people at home who are waiting for your return! Take my affectionate greetings to them, to those less fortunate, to your families and to the Christian communities that you come from.

Let me also express my gratitude to the Bishops and priests who are present in such great numbers at this Day. To them all I extend my deepest thanks, encouraging them to continue to work pastorally among young people with enthusiasm and dedication.

[Spanish] I greet the Archbishop of the Forces affectionately and I warmly thank the Spanish Air Force, which very generously permitted Cuatro Vientos Air Base on this, the centenary of the foundation of the Spanish Air Force. I place all Spanish Air Force personnel and their families under the maternal protection of Our Lady of Loreto. In this context, I recall that yesterday marked the third anniversary of the grave accident at Barajas Airport which caused many deaths and injuries, and I express my spiritual closeness and my deep affection for all those touched by that unfortunate event, and well as for the families of the victims, whose souls we commend to the mercy of God. I am pleased now to announce that the next World Youth Day will be held in 2013, in Rio de Janeiro. Even now, let us ask the Lord to assist all those who will organize it, and to ease the journey there of young people from all over the world, so that they will be able to join me in that beautiful city of Brazil.

Dear friends, before we say good-bye, and while the young people of Spain pass on the World Youth Day cross to the young people of Brazil, as Successor of Peter I entrust all of you present with this task: make the knowledge and love of Jesus Christ known to the whole world! He wants you to be the apostles of the twenty-first century and the messengers of his joy. Do not let him down! Thank you very much.

[French] My dear young people of the French-speaking world, today Christ asks you to be rooted in him and with him, to build your lives upon him who is our rock. He sends you out to be his witnesses, courageous and without anxiety, authentic and credible! Do not be afraid to be Catholic, and to be witnesses to those around you in simplicity and sincerity! Let the Church find in you and in your youthfulness joyful missionaries of the Good News of salvation!

[English] I greet all the English-speaking young people present here today! As you return home, take back with you the good news of Christ's love which we have experienced in these unforgettable days. Fix your eyes upon him, deepen your knowledge of the Gospel and bring forth abundant fruit! God bless all of you until we meet again!

[German] My dear friends! Faith is not a theory. To believe is to enter into a personal relationship with Jesus and to live in friendship with him in fellowship with others, in the communion of the Church. Entrust the whole of your lives to Christ and bring your friends to find their way to the source of life, to God. May the Lord make you happy and joy-filled witnesses of his love.

[Italian] My dear young Italians! Greetings to all of you. The Eucharist that we have celebrated is the risen Christ present and living in our midst: through him, your lives are rooted and built upon Christ, strong in faith. With this confidence, depart from Madrid and tell everyone what you have seen and heard. Respond with joy to the Lord's call, follow him and remain always united to him: you will bear much fruit!

[Portuguese] Dear Portuguese-speaking young people and friends, you have met Jesus Christ! You will be swimming against the tide in a society with a relativistic culture which wishes neither to seek nor hold on to the truth. But it was for this moment in history, with its great challenges and opportunities, that the Lord sent you, so that, through your faith, the Good News of Jesus might continue to resound throughout the earth. I hope to see you again in two years' time at the next World Youth Day in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Till then, let us pray for each other, witnessing to the joy that brings forth life, rooted in and built upon Christ. Until we meet again, my dear young people! God bless you all!

[Polish] Dear young Poles, strong in the faith, rooted in Christ! May the gifts you have received from God during these days bear in you abundant fruit. Be his witnesses.
