Our Parish cemeteries are special places providing a focus for our prayerful remembrance of the dead. Please cooperate in their maintenance and care with respect, dignity and honour. Catholic Christian Attitude to Faith and Religion: "We, unlike some of them, do not announce a Gospel of prosperity, but Christian realism. We do not announce miracles, as some do, but the sobriety of Christian life. We are convinced that all this sobriety and realism which announce a God Who became man (therefore a profoundly human God, a God Who also suffers with us) gives meaning to our own suffering. In this way, announcement has a broader horizon and a greater future. We also know that these sects are not very stable. The announcement of prosperity, of miraculous healing, etc., may do good in the short term, but we soon see that life is difficult, that a human God, a God Who suffers with us, is more convincing, truer, and offers greater help for life". *Pope Benedict XVI en route to Africa* (17th March, 2009)

Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels – John 12:20-30:

- Jesus seems to sense that a crisis point has arrived, and he agonises over saying 'yes' to what lies before him. He opts to stay faithful to the mission given him by God. Can you recall decisions over which you agonised? What was that like for you? What was it like when you made a decision that you dreaded, or were anxious about, but believed it was the right one for you?
- 2. Sometimes our emotions rebel at the thought of what lies ahead and we feel like praying *Father, save me from this hour.* Then a realisation may come for you as a parent, a teacher, a spouse, a friend: *No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour.* Recall times when you have accepted pain or hassle and been a source of life to others for doing good.
- 3. The story presents the death of Jesus as the moment of his glorification by God. It is the moment when the love of Jesus for us is shown in its greatest depth in his gift of himself, a gift he was able to make because God enabled him to do it. We are also glorified when the grace of God enables us to give generously of ourselves. When have you experienced this in yourself or in another?
- 4. This voice has come for your sake and not for mine. The angel spoke that we might recognise the love being shown us by Jesus. Sometimes it requires the voice of another to draw our attention to love which is being offered to us. When was this your experience?

Questions people ask:

- Q. I've always wondered, what is meant by the line in the Apostles Creed, 'He descended into hell'?
- A. A more recent translation of this creed states that Jesus descended to the dead. This makes it clearer that it wasn't into the hell of the damned that he descended, but that his death was real and brought him to all the dead who were waiting on the Redeemer. To quote the Catechism of the Catholic Church: 'Jesus did not descend into hell to deliver the damned, nor to destroy the hell of damnation, but to free the just who had gone before him.'

The Deep End – As You Like It:

Usually I pick the bits of scripture that I like. But not now. Verse 8 in today's Second Reading (Heb 5:7-9) grabs my attention and won't let go. The reason? It makes no sense: Jesus learning obedience through suffering! Does that mean that had he not suffered he would have been disobedient? If so, to whom? His Father? Unthinkable!

So, what is the author saying? Thank God for academics! Even though Richard Rohr in *Things Hidden* writes, 'In fact none of the Bible appears to be written out of or for academic settings' nevertheless thanks to someone's academic study of scripture a person like me can discover that in Greek there's a play on words here. The Greek for 'learned' is *emathen*, while the Greek for 'suffered' is *epathen*. The purpose of this wordplay may be to convey the close relationship between faithfulness to God and ability to face the suffering that results from such faithfulness in a sinful world.

So instead of verse 8 being a conundrum, pessimistic and negative in tone, it's now a positive and upbeat statement. It tells us that obedience (better still 'faithfulness') to God's will and suffering go hand-in-hand to some degree. But most important of all: the suffering doesn't harm the faithfulness. It can even perfect it. Furthermore, it tells us that faithfulness to God permeates all of life. Faith does not dwell in compartments, but apartments. There are no God-free zones. Facing God means facing life with all its joys and sorrows. Perhaps I should pay more attention to the bits I don't like.
