Pope Benedict's message for the World Day of Peace (Tuesday 1st January):

Blessed are the Peacemakers looks at both the theological and practical foundations for promoting justice and peace in today's world. From defense of human life to food insecurity, from religious freedom to economic development this message is a far reaching reflection on the need to establish right relationships between people and recognize that, in God, we are one human family'

Peace, Pope Benedict insists, is not a naïve, utopian dream, but rather it reflects the deepest longing of the human heart. While we must work hard to build a new world order based on truth, freedom, love and justice, as Pope John XXIII wrote in 'Pacem in Terris' half a century ago, we must also recognize that true peace is also a aift from God.

The message does spell out many practical concerns including a looming food crisis, the need for new models of development and financial practice based on people, not just profits, and the right to work as a fundamental good for individuals, families and societies. There's also a strong focus on defending the right to life, upholding traditional family values and the need for religious freedom - including conscientious objection to laws or practices which undermine the Church's teaching and beliefs.

Pope Benedict concludes his message with a call for 'a pedagogy of peace' based on pardon and reconciliation. Quoting the prayer, often attributed to St Francis of Assisi, the Pope asks God to make us instrument of His peace, bringing love, mercy and peace wherever there is hatred, hurt or doubt.

Guidelines on Use of Modern Technology when Working with Children: - Use of photography and video
The use of photography and video is an issue of great concern among those working with children. The Diocese
recognises that every parish has their own arrangements in relation to its use in schools, youth groups and for the
sacraments however the guidelines have been devised below to aid parishes and diocesan groups:

- It is always good practice to seek written permission from a parent or guardian before taking any photographs
 or video footage of children. This written permission must be sought from the parent/guardian or the person
 who owns the photograph before it can be displayed on promotional materials or websites. This can be
 incorporated in the registration form when a child joins a group (template permission Resource 10);
- Neither names nor any personal information should be displayed alongside any photographs;
- Special consideration should be given where taking photographs or video footage might be misinterpreted, or
 the images could be seen as provocative (e.g. beach trip or gymnastics display etc.). It is not to say, however,
 that with the right planning, these events cannot be recorded and enjoyed.
- Photography and video recording are important methods of recording social activity and providing an historic record illustrating and validating important moments in people's lives. This process is a powerful and personal one, and therefore we must respect the rights of everyone to make the choice whether or not to be photographed.

This Week's Calendar of Feasts and Saints:

Saturday 31st December – St. Sylvester (pope) Died in 335 after being Pope for 21 years. Being elected in the year after the Edict of Milan he was free to build many churches in Rome.

Tuesday 1st January – **Mary the Mother of God** At the message of the angel, the Virgin Mary received the Word of God in her heart and in her body, and gave life to the world. Hence she is acknowledged and honoured as being truly the Mother of God and Mother of the Redeemer.

Lumen Gentium (52)

Wednesday 2nd January – St. Basil the Great (bishop and Doctor of the Church) [330-379] Bishop of

Caesarea, a brilliant preacher who lived an ascetic life, establishing norms for monastic life. Implemented the decrees of the Council of Nicaea. Patron Saint of Russia. St. Gregory Nazianzen (bishop and Doctor of the Church) [330-379] Bishop of

Constantinople. He was known as the 'Theologian' because of his wisdom and skill in defending orthodox doctrine.

Thursday 3rd January – St. Munchin (Mainchin) (bishop) Patron Saint of the diocese of Limerick. His traditional birthplace is Dai Cais where a parish and old graveyard, Cell Mainchin (Kilmanaheen) existed. In the 7th century he was granted Inis Sibtann (Ibton) in the tidal waters of Limerick, in the region of which he funded a church and had a thriving religious

community.

Saturday 5th January – St. Charles of St. Andrew (Dublin) (priest) [1821-1893] Born in Holland. Took vows as a Passionist in 1846 and came to Mount Argus in 1857, it was there he spent most of his priestly life. His ministry in the confessional was renowned and the poor of Dublin found in him a strong support. Died on 5th January, 1893. St. Charles was canonized on 3rd June. 2007.

Friday 6th January - Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord

Seeing your life through the lens of the gospels – *Luke 2:41-52*:

- 1. Luke's skill as a storyteller comes through in the details of the story in a way that many people can identify with: the loss of a child, the frantic search, the seemingly offhand speech of the teenager. Let the drama of the story speak to you. Where do you find good news in it?
- 2. In the Gospel of Luke this story serves to give a glimpse of the future greatness of Jesus, the teacher of his people. Sometimes we can look back over our own life, or the lives of others, and with hindsight can see in childhood or teenage years a glimpse of gifts and talents that were later to blossom. Where have you seen this?
- 3. 'Did you not know that I must be about my Father's business?' This seemingly insensitive reply by Jesus to Mary serves to highlight that in his life the mission given him by God would take precedence over family ties, painful though this would be. Perhaps you have known situations in your own life, or in the life of another, where there was pain for family members in following your own destiny? Where in the midst of the pain was the good news?

- Q. When Jesus was growing up in Nazareth did Mary and Joseph knows that he was the Son of God?
- A. The revelation of the divinity of Jesus was not yet complete. Because of the virgin birth and the Annunciation by the angel Gabriel, Mary and Joseph certainly knew that Jesus was a very special person sent from God. Yet we read in the Gospel that they did not understand what the twelve year-old Jesus meant in saying that he must be busy about his Father's business. Mary and Joseph went forward in faith, accepting the mystery of what they did not fully understand.

The Deep End – Searching for Jesus:

In today's Gospel we get a glimpse of Jesus as a young boy as he disappears for three days while the family are on pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Searching for a lost child for even 20 minutes is a most nerve wracking event for a parent. But to lose the Son of God for three days is something else. You might think that Jesus is even being disobedient to his parents in this story. We should remember that ancient writers often included a scene from the childhood of their hero in order to show the signs of great things to come. Jesus is eventually found sitting with the teachers in the Temple and is revealed as a very wise teacher.

While this Gospel passage gives us a glimpse of the young boy Jesus, it is also a reminder of our own helplessness to do anything but let God's dream be dreamed. Jesus knew this in a way that his parents could not fully grasp: "Why have you done this to us?" Mary and Joseph experience the tension between the anxieties of our world and the need to listen and live centred on God.

Today we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family, we pray for families everywhere, for parents and children and ask God to be with them, to guide them and protect them.
